Named for Position by President Moore of Panama-Pacific Exposition.

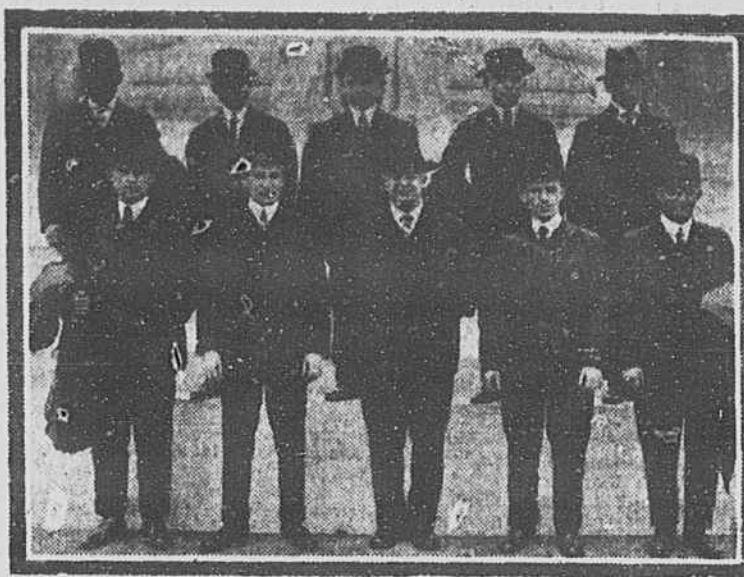
News of Anderson boys who go out into the world and make good is always of interest locally.

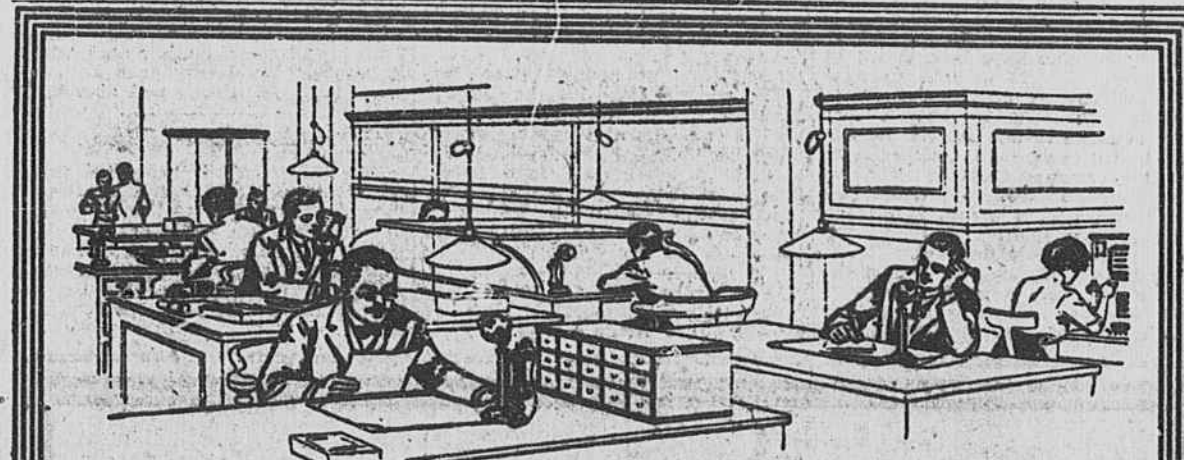
