GERMANS PLACED ON THE DEFENSIVE

gaged with British, Belgian and French in a struggle for the mastery of the territory near the Yser canal, where several months ago occurred what perhaps was most terrible struggle of the war thus far. A British correspondent in northern France says the Germans' efforts to turn the left British flank near Ypres has failed, although the battle continues violently. An official Belgian statement indicates the German attack is lessening in force.

French military authorities are cautious of accepting the theory that the German plan is to break through to the English channel, but regard it as patent that such huge concentration troops on a limited front means that the present German drive is preparatory to some more important undertaking.

Russian and Austrian official communications indicate fighting in the Carpathians is becoming more intense. Each side claims they have defeated attacks of the other. Military observers in Petrograd expect decisive operations soon.

The Dardanelles situation remains obscure, although it is apparent the British and French have made some headway in landing operations. The French war office has announced the capture of Kum Kaleh on Asiatic side.

French Have a Foothold. PARIS, April 28.—French troops have occupied Kum Kaleh, the Turkish fortress on the Asiatic side of the entrance to the Dardanelles. This announcement was made officially last night. "During the disembarking Sunday of the allied forces at the Dardanelles," the official communication says, "French troops, comprising infantry and artillery, had been designated particularly for operations at Kum Kaleh, on the Asiatic side. Their mission was completely and successfully fulfilled. "Aided by the cannon of the French fleet and under the fire of the enemy our troops occupied the village, and have continued its occupation, despite seven counter attacks at night, supported by heavy artillery."

MORE EXECUTIONS THAN EVER BEFORE

WILL BE ISSUED AGAINST PROPERTY THIS YEAR IN ANDERSON

MANY POLLS ALSO Are Yet To Be Paid—County Treasurer Now Entering Up Judgments.

That there will be more property to go into execution this year than ever before on account of unpaid taxes, is the interesting information coming from the office of the county auditor.

It is estimated that in the city of Anderson alone there will be more than 1,200 pieces of property which will go into execution, and something like 3,500 in the entire county.

There are fully 1,000 polls in the county, it is estimated, who have not paid this tax, and these, of course, will be called upon by the sheriff. Already, it is stated, the treasurer has begun entering up the executions, and in the next few days will turn the papers over to the sheriff.

SAY MILITARY CENSORS OPPOSED TO SOCIALISTS

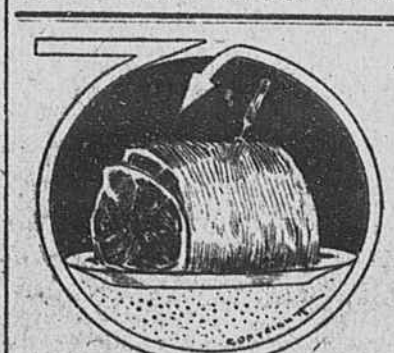
Deputy Stadthagen Attacks Methods in Speech in Reichstag.

COPENHAGEN, April 27.—The newspapers here have obtained copies of the official report of the debate in the German Reichstag on the Imperial Budget, including the text of the speech made by the Socialist Deputy, Stadthagen, which the military censors refused to allow the German newspapers to publish. The speech deals entirely with the German press censorship.

Stadthagen said in part: "From all parts of the country come strong protests against the severity, the inequality, the injustice, the inefficiency of the censorship. The military censors have made the whole of the Socialist press a target for their malicious attacks, which are not intended to preserve military secrets, but to suppress the free discussion of questions in regard to which the people of Germany have the fullest right to express their opinion. The Volkzeitung, our local organ at Danzig, was suppressed for saying that there was no danger of a famine in Germany, but that the price of many necessities of life was too high for the working classes and imposed considerable hardships on them. At Koln, our local daily paper was suppressed for saying that the victories won by the German army were due to the fact that universal manhood suffrage exists in Germany and to the right possessed by German workmen to combine in trade unions or in political associations."

"At Katowitz our paper, the Freie Presse, had always appeared at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, but the military censor there insisted on seeing all the proofs before publication, and then declared that he had no time to read them before 3 o'clock, with the result that the publication of the paper had to be delayed until some hour of the evening, sometimes later, according to the whim of the august official who wielded despotic sway in those regions."

"The Vorwaerts received a warning from the military authorities because it protested against widely sensational reports of English atrocities on German prisoners on the grounds that such reports stimulated public enthusiasm for the war, and hence to discredit them meant diminishing enthusiasm for the war. When the Vorwaerts protested against the publication of a report that the German army had captured Belfort and seven French army corps (about 350,000 men) at one stroke, the military authorities in Berlin warned the editor that he was doing a public disservice, and exposed his paper to the

She hopes that some of the school districts in the county will take advantage of this proposition and get in among the first on this new school law.

The company will hike to High Shoals, where there is a splendid location for a camp, and will spend the night there. The "dog" tents will be taken along for protection against weather. Maneuvers of various kinds will be indulged in while the militiamen are on the outing.

Hot Game of Ball Friday. The Anderson high school and the Central high school of Greenville will meet in the first game of the season in Anderson on Friday afternoon. Both teams play good ball, and the game is going to be a good one, and the boys of the high school urge the public to come out and see them "beat the lads from Greenville."

Dr. Vines Made No Announcement. In the article in Wednesday's issue of The Intelligencer stating that Dr. John F. Vines, pastor of the First Baptist church of this city, had received a call to the pastorate of the First Baptist church of Roanoke, Va., the reporter unconsciously erred in making use of the statement that Dr. Vines "announced" that he had received the call. As a matter of fact, Dr. Vines was out of the city and knew nothing of the matter until so advised. The first news received here about the matter was a Richmond, Va., dispatch appearing in the Spartanburg Herald of Tuesday morning. No announcement was made by anyone in this city that Dr. Vines had received such a call, and, as a matter of fact, those who knew about it endeavored to keep the fact to themselves.

penalty of suppression. The Vorwaerts was not allowed to reply to attacks made on it by another Berlin paper, the Neueste Nachrichten, which is a Conservative organ, although this journal had been permitted to libel the Vorwaerts in the grossest terms of abuse. "On another occasion the Vorwaerts was not allowed to publish a speech made in the Berlin town council by Herr Wurum, in which the authorities were urged to prevent the prices of necessary commodities of everyday life from being raised above a certain level. The publication of the Vorwaerts was temporarily suspended for declaring that the hostility existing in other countries against Germany was due to the fact that the German method of government is based on autocracy and militarism which together had produced many undesirable features. "We were even forbidden to reprint an attack on the English censor published by the London weekly Truth. The Vorwaerts was forbidden to publish an article saying that the destruction of the despotism of the Czar would be a blessing to the Russian people; doubtless our astute censors thought this was an indirect hit at the German emperor. The Vorwaerts was not allowed to publish a speech made by the English member of parliament, Ramsay MacDonald, in which Macdonald spoke against the war, and other anti-war utterances made in England were likewise suppressed. Why? These are only a few cases selected from many of which we know, but the suffices to show that the censorship is badly administered, inefficiently conducted, and finally balanced, so that energetic measures should be taken by the supreme authorities to remedy what is really a grave danger to the welfare of the German nation."

Zapata Destroys Railroad. WASHINGTON, April 28.—Zapata forces, operating behind General Oregon, Carranza's commander at Celaya, have cut rail and wire communication and destroyed part of the railway between Mexico City and Vera Cruz. Duval West, President Wilson's personal representative is held up on a train delayed by the break.

Weather Halted Efforts TO RAISE SUBMARINE. HONOLULU, April 28.—The efforts of the several weeks past to raise the sunken submarine F-4 have practically been undone by the recent rough weather. Only one of the lines is fast to the hulk now, it was learned this morning. The screws, used in the raising operations have been anchored to prevent their drifting to sea. The weather conditions make diving impossible.

Change Name of Culebra Cut. WASHINGTON, April 28.—President Wilson today signed an executive order changing the name of Culebra Cut in the Panama canal to "Galliard Cut" in honor of the late Colonel D. U. Galliard, who died from disease while a member of Isthmian canal commission. Colonel Galliard was from South Carolina.

He Missed a Fortune. In spite of their night-and-day activity in raiding and destroying the hundreds of illicit stills that are manufacturing moonshine in the mountains, the revenue officers of Georgia, have found time to report the discovery of an invention, which, had it been patented by its discoverer, might have brought him an immense fortune. The art of distillation is an ancient one, yet little progress has been made in the process since the first "worm," or twisted tube was used to condense the vapors which arise from the boiling liquid. Frank Whatley, a Georgian conducted a still on his place in the Blue Ridge mountains. Since prohibition went into effect, the demand for moonshine has leaped to enormous proportions. Whatley saw that if he could increase the output of his still he would make more money. So he set to work and constructed a still, which, according to the officers, "instead of the usual worm or coil, contained device with a double surface for condensing the vaporized alcoholic fumes. The device is enclosed in an air space in which the vapors float and are condensed rapidly as the water passes through the body of the cylinder. It is the most efficient condensation system we have ever seen and it is a pity Whatley did not try to market his device instead of making moonshine."

The 42-Centimetre Shot. This is the terror of the war, the German 42-centimetre shot, guaranteed to tear up the strongest fort so far built. In fact, it is believed engineers have given up hope of making a fort so strong it will hold in an excellent state of preservation. The illustration shows the shot in comparison with some of those of French guns. It is sixteen and one-half inches in diameter and sixty-four inches long. The French shots are less than three inches in diameter.

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
