Centennial Varennes Church Yesterday An Interesting Occasion

GREAT THROG OF PEOPLE WERE ON HAND FOR SECOND DAY'S SESSION

AN IMPORTANT MATTER TODAY

Chicora College Question Will Be Brought Before the Presbytery.

The second day of the spring meeting of Piedmont Presbytery, in session at Varennes church, was given over yesterday largely to the celebration of the centennial of this historic church. Several hundred people from all sections of the county, including the city of Anderson, were present and a most enjoyable day was spent.

The address of the day was delivered by the Rev. W. H. Mills, of Clemson College, who spoke on "The Country Church the Center of the Social Life of the Community." The address was a masterful one and was thoroughly enjoyed by the large congregation present.

Next of interest and importance on the program was the reading of the history of Varennes church by Ruling Elder M. A. Thompson. This was followed by a paper entitled "Reminiscences of 30 Years Pastorate at Varennes Church," by the Rev. H. C. Fennie, of Lowndesville.

So delightful were all three addresses the Presbytery by unanimous vote decided to have them put in permanent form.

The greater part of the morning session was taken up with the considering of reports from the various churches and the referring of various matters to the proper committees.

Davidson Matter Up.

An interesting matter which came up during the day was the discussion of the advisability of the South Carolina Presbyteries giving up their privilege of electing trustees of Davidson College, North Carolina, and devoting all of their interests to the State Presbyterian College. The question arose when the matter of electing a successor to the late Dr. F. F. Smith, of Easley, on the board of trustees of Davidson. After a very spirited debate on the matter, Piedmont Presbytery decided to retain this privilege, and elected Mr. W. C. Smith, brother of Dr. R. F. Smith, to the vacancy.

Address Called On.

Owing to threatening weather conditions, it was decided to postpone the sermon of the occasion, which was to have been delivered last night at 8 o'clock, by the Rev. J. W. Vinson, of Sherman, Texas. The sermon will be delivered this morning.

A pleasant feature of the day's session was the bountiful picnic dinner served by the good housewives of the community.

Today's Business.

One of the most important matters to be brought before the Presbytery today will be that of the Chicora College proposition. It is understood that a proposition will be presented from the town of Clinton recommending that both the Greenville property and the property recently acquired in Columbia be sold and the college moved to Clinton.

As generally known, Chicora College was recently tendered the property of the College for Women in Columbia, valued at some \$200,000, on condition the Greenville institution assume the indebtedness of the institution, amounting to some \$200,000.

It is reliably reported that the town of Clinton will offer a site and \$50,000 for the removal of Chicora to that town. It is understood that there is a very strong sentiment in Piedmont Presbytery for the moving of the college to Clinton, for the reason that the Presbyterian college for young men is already there and it is believed there are certain advantages to be had from concentrating the educational institutions of the denomination in one place, insofar as is practicable.

22,000 DEAD FLIES SLAYED IN A DAY

This Number of Pests Were Delivered to The Anderson Theatre.

Fully 20,000 flies met their death yesterday as a result of the announcement by the management of The Anderson theatre that each child delivering at the box office as many as 25 dead flies would be given a free ticket to the picture show.

It is estimated by the management of the theatre that between 400 and 500 children were admitted to the show as a result of the fly crusade. It will be seen that if each 25 of the 20,000 flies brought to the box office had admitted a child, there would have been 800 admissions. But some of the youngsters brought more than 25 of the pests. In fact, one little fellow brought 201 flies, while another came in with 109.

Just what the killing of 20,000 flies at this time means in the way of cutting down the number of flies that would have been existing in the season is impossible to calculate, but it is safe to say that many millions of the pests have thus been headed off.

FUNERAL MRS. HUTCHINSON

Large Concourse of Sorrowing Friends Paid Their Respect to Noble Woman.

The funeral services of Mrs. Annie Elizabeth Hutchinson, who died early yesterday morning, at her home on North Main street, were held yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock at the residence, conducted by the Rev. John F. Vines, pastor of the First Baptist church, of which she was a devoted member, and the Rev. O. L. Martin. Interment was at Silver Brook cemetery.

Mrs. Hutchinson was one of the most highly esteemed women and one of the most consecrated Christians in the county, and her death is a great loss to the community. A large number of sorrowing friends were present to pay their respects to this noble woman. The floral offerings were numerous and exquisite, attesting the love and esteem in which she was held.
