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Tempérance.

The following article on temperance was written by A. L. Smethers, M. D., an honored deacon and superintendent of the Sunday school of the First Baptist church of Anderson and read by him before the Saluda Association at Barker's Creek church in August, 1912. The editor takes great pleasure in giving it to the readers of the Sentinel believing that it will be appreciated by all. We earnestly hope that it will be carefully read and studied by all our readers.

Report on Temperance, read at the Saluda Association July 30th, 1911:

We have passed the age of temperance in dealing with temperance problems, and nothing but a scientific, educational campaign will accomplish what ought to be done along this line. Such a campaign has been begun in the Saluda association. Temperance addresses have been made by ministers, lawyers, doctors and others, during the association year, which we feel sure will prove to be good seeds sown in good soil, and we pray that it shall grow and grow until there shall be gathered a rich harvest of total abstainers, who shall not only never cast their vote for rum in any form, but who shall, in a loving Christian spirit, try to prevail upon their neighbors and kinsmen to do likewise.

Alcohol is a poisonous drug, and, as such, should be confined to the drug store, and never sold as a beverage.

Effects on the body—The alimentary canal is a long, hollow tube, extending through the body cavity. In the economy of nature the cells of this tract are differentiated, so that through the process of digestion, assimilation and absorption, the complicated human machine grows and is constantly repairing losses caused by labor.

Situated within the walls and in close proximity to this tract are many glands, each of which has a special duty to perform in the above mentioned process. Alcohol, (and by this term we mean any beverage containing alcohol, from the mildest brew to absolute alcohol), by extracting the water from the mucous membrane lining of the mouth, throat and esophagus and stomach, causes such thirst that one drink calls for another; also, because of its poisonous property, it acts as a local irritant.

This local irritation long continued, tends to produce chronic inflammation, which always militates against the glandular secretions.

Experiment has proven that the hardening influence of alcohol on dead tissue (the food) retards the process of digestion and causes dilatation of the stomach. This, in part, accounts for the protruding abdomen in so many persons addicted to the use of strong drink.

We shall speak of the influence of alcohol only on one of the glands along the digestive tract—the liver, that organ we accuse when we are stupid, listless and ill, though the fact is, that we ourselves are to blame for having imposed on a good organ that knows no better than to do its best under all circumstances.

Strong drink is by far the

most frequent cause of cirrhosis of the liver, a disease which is absolutely incurable, either medically or surgically. In this disease, the soft pulpy liver cells that you are acquainted with, are replaced by connective tissues, and the liver becomes a small hard mass, almost entirely functionless, and the owner fills an untimely grave because he has lost the power of mastery over himself.

The blossom—I mean the red nose of the tippler—is due to the influence of alcohol upon the circulatory system—the heart, arteries, veins and capillaries. Here let me pause long enough to say that in certain diseases, as pneumonia, alcohol may be used to an advantage as a stimulant, but should never be administered except at the direction of a licensed physician.

Effect on the mind—On the mind, alcohol acts as a stimulant, and this is one of the chief reasons why men drink. They find it pleasant for a short time but soon need more and more of the drug to produce and maintain this pleasant sensation, and so is brought about such dulling and beclouding of the faculties that a man does not begin to equal his original self in mental capacity, and loses all power to control his own body.

Then, finally, because intellect and reason and judgment have been dethroned, all the centres except those controlling respiration and heart-beat are overcome, and he is paralyzed in body and mind—a pitiable creature, lower than the brute.

Effect on morals—Strong drink produces a pernicious drug habit, and any evil habit blights the moral nature, because the individual loses control of the will and consequently cannot resist the power of the habit itself, nor subdue the stormy passions that are the direct out-growth of the same.

A little alcohol will often benumb the moral sensibilities to such a degree that men commit sins and crimes that, for decency's sake, we must not even mention here, and which they, in their sane moments, regret many times with deep yet ineffectual remorse.

The long continued use of the drug, however, will make even remorse impossible, and will bring the helpless victim to the place where he cares absolutely nothing for his own good name, nothing for his influence in the community, nothing for the awful tendency toward imbecility, in himself and in the generations to follow him, nothing for the probable criminal character of his children, nothing for the awful responsibility and danger of leading men to hell, nothing for his own soul, nothing, absolutely nothing that he has forever shut himself away from a gracious forgiving Father.

Congressman A. F. Lever, of the seventh district has been appointed a life member of the board of trustees of Clemson College to succeed the late R. W. Simpson.

In the primary on the 1st instant for congressman to succeed Hon. George S. Legare, deceased, in the First Congressional district, R. W. Whaley led with E. W. Hughes a close second. These two men will run over.

At a meeting of the board of trustees Wednesday, the governor introduced a resolution calling for the resignation of Dr. S. C. Mitchell, as president of the University of South Carolina. The resolution was put to a vote and was indorsed by the governor, the other members voting no.

Other cities made liberal offers to secure the sanitarium but the committee felt that the future growth and development of the institution would be greater and that it would be more conveniently located in Columbia.


