The Fighting Man

Prof. Daniels, of Clemson College, delivered an address before the graduating class of the Pickens High School a short while ago. At the beginning of his address he said from the smallest insect on up to the larger animals it was eat or be eaten.

He paid a beautiful tribute to the old Confederate veterans who faced the hardships during the sixties and fought for what they thought to be right. He said we all hoped to see the day when war would be no more—when troubles and differences would be settled by arbitration. What he wanted to impress upon the people was, if you get far in life you have to fight for it.
