The stockholders of the Alice Cotton Mill held their annual meeting in the office of the company last Thursday afternoon at 4 o'clock. Mr. John Geer was elected president succeeding Mr. E. H. Shanklin, resigned, with the following board of directors: W. M. Hagood, W. C. Smith, R. F. Smith, R. F. Lenhardt of Easley, Frank Hammond of Greenville, and J. McD. Bruce of Pickens.

A very full attendance of the stock was represented and a most harmonious meeting held. A favorable report of the American Audit Co. was read, which was most gratifying to the stockholders, sending them home happy and satisfied, feeling assured that under the efficient management of the new president the mill would meet with the same phenomenal success his other mills have attained.

Still Destroyed.

One man was captured and brought before United States Commissioner Hagood here and bound over to Federal Court.

Notice of Election.

The State of South Carolina, County of Pickens.

Notice is hereby given that a general election for the purpose of electing a successor to fill the unexpired term of Fred Williams, deceased, as a member of the House of Representatives from Pickens County, South Carolina, will be held at the several voting precincts fixed by law in the County of Pickens, S. C., on Tuesday, November 4, 1913, said day being Tuesday following the first Monday in November, as prescribed by the Constitution.

The qualifications for suffrage are as follows:

Managers of election shall require of every elector offering to vote at any election, before allowing him to vote, the production of his registration certificate and proof of the payment of all taxes, including poll tax, assessed against him and collectable during the previous year. The production of a certificate or of the receipt of the officer authorized to collect such taxes shall be conclusive proof of the payment thereof.

Before the hour fixed for opening the polls Managers and Clerks must take and subscribe the Constitutional oath. The Chairman of the Board of Managers can administer the oath to the other members and to the Clerk; a Notary Public must administer the oath to the Chairman. The Managers elect their chairman and clerk.

Polls at each voting place must be opened at 7 o'clock a. m. and closed at 4 o'clock p. m.

The managers have the power to fill a vacancy, and if none of the managers attend, the citizens can appoint from among the qualified voters, the Man-

agers, who, after being sworn, can conduct the election.

At the close of the election, the Managers and Clerk must proceed publicly to open the ballot boxes and count the ballots therein, and continue without adjournment until the same is completed, and make a statement of the result for each office and sign the same. Within three days thereafter, the Chairman of the Board, or some one designated by the Board, must deliver to the Commissioners of Election the poll list, the boxes containing the ballots and written statements of the results of the election.
