

Letter from J. L. Harley.

Spartanburg, S. C., Oct. 22.
 Editor: Please allow me to say through the columns of your paper that the call for a Prohibition Convention to be held in Columbia the latter part of this month has no connection whatever with the Anti-Saloon League of South Carolina. A great many people of the State, somehow have gotten the impression that the Anti-Saloon League is trying to organize a third party, known as the Prohibition party of South Carolina. Let me say once and for all that the Anti-Saloon League is not a party organization and that we do not believe in the third party movement. We believe in white supremacy and look entirely to the Democratic party of South Carolina for relief in the present situation.
 The Convention to be held in Columbia in a few days is called by the leader of the Third Party Prohibitionists in this State. I suppose it is generally known that the Third Party Prohibitionists throughout the nation array themselves against all other parties, especially against the Democratic and Republican. Mr. Eugene W. Chafin is regarded as their National leader and was their nominee for the presidency in 1908. The following from his speech of acceptance of the nomination explains fully their attitude towards the Democrats and Republicans everywhere:
 "We are now approaching the close of another fifty years, where two dominant political parties, Republican and Democratic, have allied themselves with the most gigantic crime that ever cursed the world, and by their attitude make known to the American people that they do not propose to permit

them to have a chance, even though the majority may favor it, to destroy the liquor traffic, and add another amendment to the Constitution which would mark the highest achievement of civilization in the world's history."
 Mr. Chafin may have been perfectly conscientious in this utterance, and yet within the past five years, too much has been accomplished by Republicans and Democrats along the line of prohibition to chronicle here. The world knows today that we have a Democratic administration at Washington which stands for purity and all modern reforms. It is generally known that the Jones-Works Bill has passed Congress, cleaning up the District of Columbia, and that the Webb-Kenyon Bill became a law by the votes of Democrats and Republicans alike, regulating the interstate commerce in intoxicating liquors.
 The Anti-Saloon League of South Carolina is looking to the white Democrats to aid in the destruction of the liquor traffic, and we believe they will do it, without any split in the party or separate organization for this purpose. (Signed)

Division of State Is Political Move Says V. B. Cheshire

Candidate for Congress Knocks Aiken's Latest Move. CHESHIRE IN SENECA Will Make a House-to-House Canvass of Third District

Col. Victor B. Cheshire, candidate for congress, until a few weeks ago editor and owner of the Anderson Intelligencer, was in Seneca for a few hours Saturday afternoon. Mrs. Cheshire accompanied him. They were on their way to spend Sunday with Mr. Cheshire's friend, John Abbott, of near New Hope.
 During his short stay in Seneca Col. Cheshire was a welcome visitor to Farm and Factory office. He talked interestingly of political matters in South Carolina, and particularly of his race for congress against Hon. Wyatt Aiken and Fred Dominick, assistant attorney general of South Carolina. He is confident of being in the second race and of defeating his opponent in the final round.
 Col. Cheshire says that he has not started to devoting his entire time to his campaign yet, but is at present engaged in looking after the construction of several new houses in the city of Anderson. After he has finished this work he will start out on a house-to-house canvass of the entire third district. He will travel by automobile and give his entire time to his campaign.
 Asked as to his opinion re-

garding Wyatt Aiken's bill to divide the state into two federal districts, thereby erasing new officers, the more important being a judge and marshal. Colonel Cheshire said that it was simply another one of Aiken's moves in behalf of his race for congress. There is little chance of the bill passing, said Mr. Cheshire, but in the event it does, Mr. Aiken will have charge of the turning out of several "plans," and in this way help his chances of reelection.
 The entrance of Mr. Cheshire into the congressional fight makes it sure that there will be warm times in the third district next year. He will be one of the most energetic campaigners that ever mounted a stump in South Carolina. Through his connection with the Intelligencer, which under his management was one of the most influential papers in the upper part of the state, he has become widely known and liked by the people of this district, and in all probability he will make a good showing in the forthcoming race.—Seneca Farm and Factory.
