Much Tax Money Yet to be Paid

Up to January 23d the following number of tax receipts remained on the treasurer's books unpaid: In Easley township, 724; Liberty, 371; Central, 475; Hurricane, 192; Pumpkintown, 111; Eastatoe, 112; two corporations, total, 2,538; leaving nearly half of the receipts yet to be issued.

After January 29th two per cent will be added to the original amount of tax.

Good Entertainment For Pickens.

Good news for lovers of high class entertainments in Pickens is the announcement that the third, and next to last, number of the lyceum course will be the "Four Bostonians", who will appear at the school auditorium Wednesday evening, February 18.

I. M. Mauldin Trustee Rallies Are Being Held This Week

The first of a series of educational and agricultural rallies to be held in Pickens county this week was held at Dacusville Monday, and it was a good meeting. About 200 people were present, and not only was close attention given the speakers but great interest was shown by the people of that community in the different lines of work.

W. H. Barton, assistant state demonstration agent, spoke about soil building and W. E. Stewart, farm demonstration agent for Greenville county, spoke about boy's corn clubs. These two subjects are of great interest in Pickens county just now. Our farmers are on the right track and this county is rapidly advancing in an agricultural way.

There are more than 1,200 members of the boy's corn clubs in this state and the average of 80 bushels (the acre at a cost of 10 cents) is being produced. This is a record, but the cost of a bushel is 10 cents. With proper soil building, the cost of a bushel is now being introduced, and which have been proved practical farmers elsewhere, the cost of raising corn, and other crops, can be greatly reduced.

The interest taken by Pickens county farmers in agricultural and educational advancement can only mean that some day this county will lead all others in these lines.
