At this point a most sumptuous dinner was spread on a long table in the grove nearby, and after thanks was returned by Rev. D. D. Jones of Easley, everybody seemed to enjoy the great feast of good things the good ladies of Dacusville had prepared.

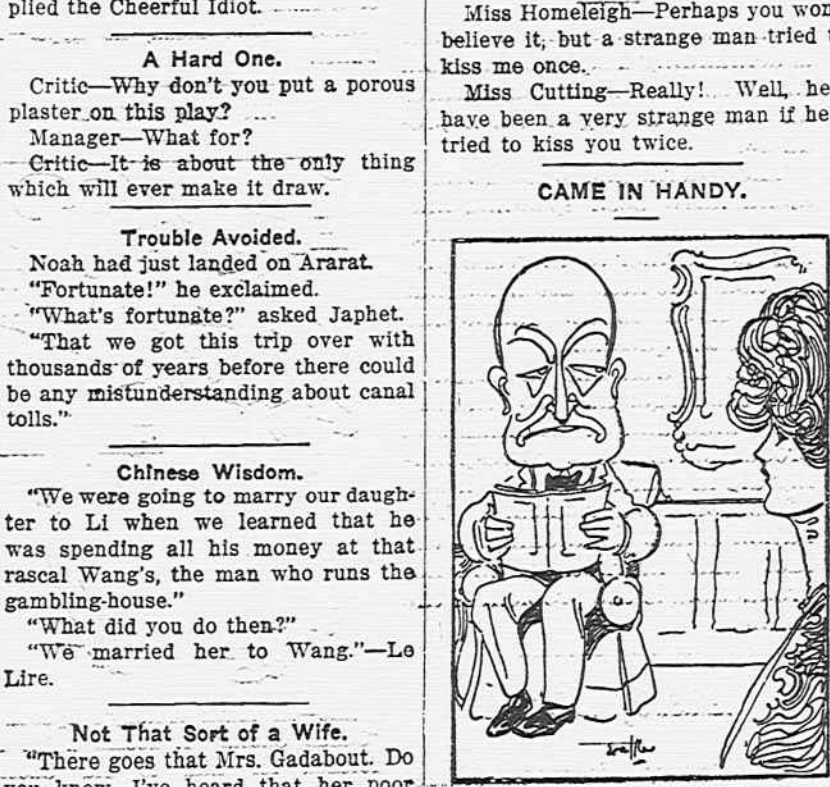
