Prominent Man Passed Away

Judge John C. Bailey, for thirty years one of the foremost newspaper men of South Carolina, died in Greenville last Sunday. He was editor of the Mountaineer, a prominent weekly newspaper of Reconstruction days and did valiant service as editor of the Democrat in the days of Hampton. Some one said of him "His nature was sweet and gentle and among those who knew him best, he was most beloved. A Christian gentleman, a Democrat and one who wielded a powerful personality for good in the community, he left an imprint upon the county for good that will live after he is gone." Judge Bailey had lived in Greenville over fifty years and for thirty years he was a deacon in the Presbyterian church. He was more than seventy years of age and was the father of Rev. J. C. Bailey, pastor of the Presbyterian churches at Liberty and Pickens.
