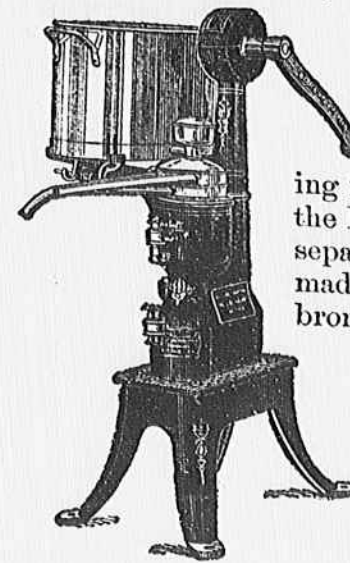
### Mrs. Jane Childress Dead
