TEXTILE EXHIBIT IN SOUTH

Big Exposition For Cotton Mill Men to Be Held at Greenville, South Carolina, November 2-6.

Greenville, S. C.—Cotton mill superintendents and overseers from Southern States who have been going to Boston every other year, or wishing to go, to inspect exhibits of textile machinery and textile products, will this fall have an exposition for their benefit at Greenville, S. C., that promises to be, for cotton manufacturers at least, nearly, if not quite, as complete as any that has ever been held in the United States.

Robert F. Bove of Greenville, S. C., is at the head of the exposition, and W. M. Sherard of Williamston, S. C., is president of the Southern Textile Association. They claim that as the south is now consuming more than half of the cotton manufactured into cotton goods in the United States, the mill men who have direct charge of these vast operations should have expositions of improved manufacturing devices brought to convenient places for their inspection.

The dates of the meetings and show at Greenville are Nov. 2 to 6, inclusive. The exposition will be in four departments: machinery and mill supplies; cotton fabrics and finished products; textile colleges and mill village welfare departments; Government exhibit of South American fabrics.

Capt. Otis P. Mills. Greenville.—Capt. Otis P. Mills, president and treasurer of the Mills Manufacturing company and one of Greenville's most prominent citizens, died suddenly at his summer home at Cedar Mountain, N. C. Capt. Mills was born in Henderson county, North Carolina, February 22, 1840. Most of his boyhood days were spent in Hendersonville, and when the War Between the Sections began he enlisted in the Fifty-sixth North Carolina regiment, Company G. He took part in all the principal battles of his command.

Fire Destroys Clinton Store. Clinton.—The large mercantile establishment of Bailey Bros., one of the oldest and strongest businesses of the town, was completely destroyed by fire. The entire two-story building and all its contents were destroyed, no goods being saved. No cause can be given to the fire. The total loss aggregated \$50,000 and was well insured although not being enough to cover the loss. The firm is composed of R. L. Bailey and C. C. Bailey.

Building New Warehouse. Chester.—Work on the new brick warehouse of the Rodman-Brown company is progressing rapidly and the structure will be completed in a few weeks. The building will consist of one 16-foot story, will have concrete floor and plate glass doors and will be 20 by 100 feet in size.

Young Lad Drowns. Swansea.—A distressing accident occurred at Craft's mill pond, eight miles west of here, in which Addison, the 10-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. D. Clifton Jefeaton, was drowned.
