To Erect Monument to Memory of Fred Griffin

We learn that the people of Alabama are raising a fund to erect a monument to the memory of Fred A. Griffin, the first American soldier to die in the defense of his country when the Mexican bandits attacked Columbus, N. M., several weeks ago. Although Mr. Griffin enlisted in the army from Alabama and his body was buried there, he was a native of Pickens county, having been born in Pickens town, and his grandfather, Capt. James A. Griffin, a hero of the civil war and reconstruction days, is a native of this county, and lives near Pickens. He also has many other prominent relatives in Pickens county.

A movement has been started in Pickens county to raise a fund in South Carolina to add to the Alabama fund for the erection of a monument to this young hero and no doubt many will be glad of the opportunity to contribute to such a fund. No one will be urged to contribute, but an opportunity will be given all. The idea is not to have a very large contribution from any one person, but for many persons to contribute a small amount each. Pickens county should have many names on the list. Any one wishing to make a contribution for the erection of the monument may send the money to The Pickens Sentinel or to E. R. Griffin, Pickens, who will make a proper accounting for it and turn it over to the monument committee.

Another Old Vet Gone to Reward

G. Wash Lesley, a prominent citizen of the Griffin community, died at his home on the 29th of March after an illness of about a week. He was nearly 75 years old. He was in the civil war three and a half years and lost a foot from a wound. He was a deacon of the church at Griffin, where he was buried the day following his death, funeral services being conducted by his pastor, Rev. Fulton Childress. Mr. Lesley was twice married. His first wife was Miss Elizabeth Trotter. To this union nine children were born and are still living. The sons are Henry D., W. D., G. W. and John; the daughters are Mrs. James Anthony, Mrs. Barney Porter, Mrs. Anna Breazeale, Mrs. Tula Trotter, Mrs. Minnie Williams. The children are all living in this county. His last wife was Miss Nancy Henderson. She still survives him. To the bereaved we extend our sympathy.

Friday, March 31, the day after his grandfather was buried, young Henry B. Lesley died at the home of his father, Henry D. Lesley, in the 16th year of his life, after suffering intensely for nine weeks. He had been operated on for abscess of the lungs. All that medical skill and good nursing could do failed to bring relief. Young Lesley was a christian and told his father he was not afraid to die; that he knew that Jesus would take care of him. This sad when one so young is called away, but it is glorious to know that they were ready to go. His body was laid away in the churchyard at Griffin April 1. Funeral services were conducted by the pastor, Rev. F. Childress. We extend our sympathies to the bereaved ones.

Interesting Letter From Mr. Weams

Dalton, Ga., March 16, 1916.
Editor Pickens Sentinel:

If you will allow me a little space in your valuable paper I will let your readers hear from one who has always held South Carolina in the highest esteem, and especially Pickens county, the county that holds my birthplace. It would surprise many people to know that 50 per cent. of the people of Gordon and Whitfield counties either came direct or their ancestors came from the Palmetto state.

I was in Mr. Warren Sutherland's home last week and found a copy of your paper. I notice quite a good many changes are taking place in Pickens county. Mr. Sutherland and Mr. Dacus live near each other and both have splendid farms. The Dacus boys are doing a fine mercantile business at Sugar Valley. I see Mr. B. M. Hester and family occasionally. He has a splendid home in Resaca, Ga.

Last Sunday Claude Leslie and myself conducted an all-day singing just a few miles out from Dalton, where Claude is teaching his fourth class inside of 12 months. Prof. S. Melton Singleton was also with us. We had a grand time. The books used were "Golden Gospel Bells" and "Joy for the Redeemed." I am using in my present class in Dalton the above-named books; also "Praise and Thanksgiving." I am teaching my sixth school since November 26. These were 18-day schools, and I have been idle only one week since November 10. Have just signed a contract with 21 stockholders to teach an 18-day school just a few miles from here next August. Have 35 calls to teach next summer.

This is a good country, but needs developing. The roads are not well worked, largely on account of having no system. The Dixie highway, which passes along Sherman's route, is a fine road.

Not much wheat is grown in this country. Corn and cotton are the main products grown here. Farmers are slow about starting off with their work. This seems to be a late year. The temperature was down to about 18 yesterday and we had some snow.

Most all of the fine peach orchards have been destroyed because they didn't pay.

This is considered a very healthy country. However, there has been lots of grip. I taught a class in Allen county, Ky., and the physician in that community had 28 cases of pneumonia at one time. While in Kentucky I saw a tree Daniel Boone carved his name on in 1781. Also sang within a few miles of the Mammoth Cave.
