At an election held at Central last Friday the \$10,000 bond issue was carried by a vote of 84 to 1 in favor of issuing the bonds.

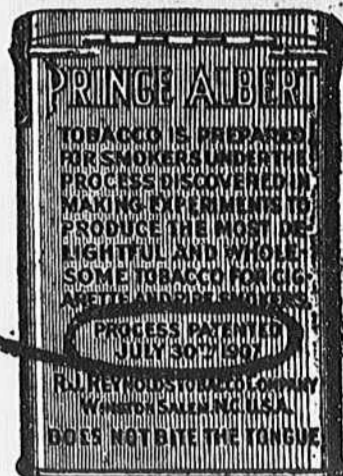
