- Best 1 pint jar tomato pickles (sour) 50 cents.
- Best 1 pint jar tomato puree, 50 cents.
- Best 1 pint jar tomato paste, 50 cents.

- Best 6 No. 3 cans tomatoes, \$1.50.

No. 4.—Best display of canned fruits, 2 qt. jars peaches, 2 qt. jars apples, 2 qt. jars plums, 2 qt. jars cherries, 2 qt. jars berries, \$5.00.

No. 5.—Best pickle display, including 2 No. 5042 jars Dixie relish, 2 No. 5042 jars mustard paste pickle, 2 No. 5042 green tomato pickle (sour), 2 No. 5042 jars green tomato pickle (sweet) \$2.00.

No. 6.—Best all year's work, including history, exhibit, record book, garden, etc., scholarship to Winthrop.

No. 7.—Second best all year's work, scholarship to Winthrop.

No. 8.—Third best all year's work, trip to state fair.

Over 300 Examined For Army Last Week

More than 300 men were examined in Pickens last Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday for entrance into the United States army. Of this number forty-nine passed the physical examination and did not claim exemption. Many more who passed the examination claimed exemption, but their claims have not yet been passed upon. Thirty-odd failed to appear for examination and these were listed as passing and will be sent direct to the army.

Pickens county is called upon to furnish 182 men by October. The first sixty will be called upon to report by September 5, one third more by September 15, and the other third by September 30.

The examinations were held over the Keowee Pharmacy and conducted by Dr. J. L. Valley of Pickens, Dr. L. L. Jameson of Easley, and Dr. J. D. Bear-den of Central.

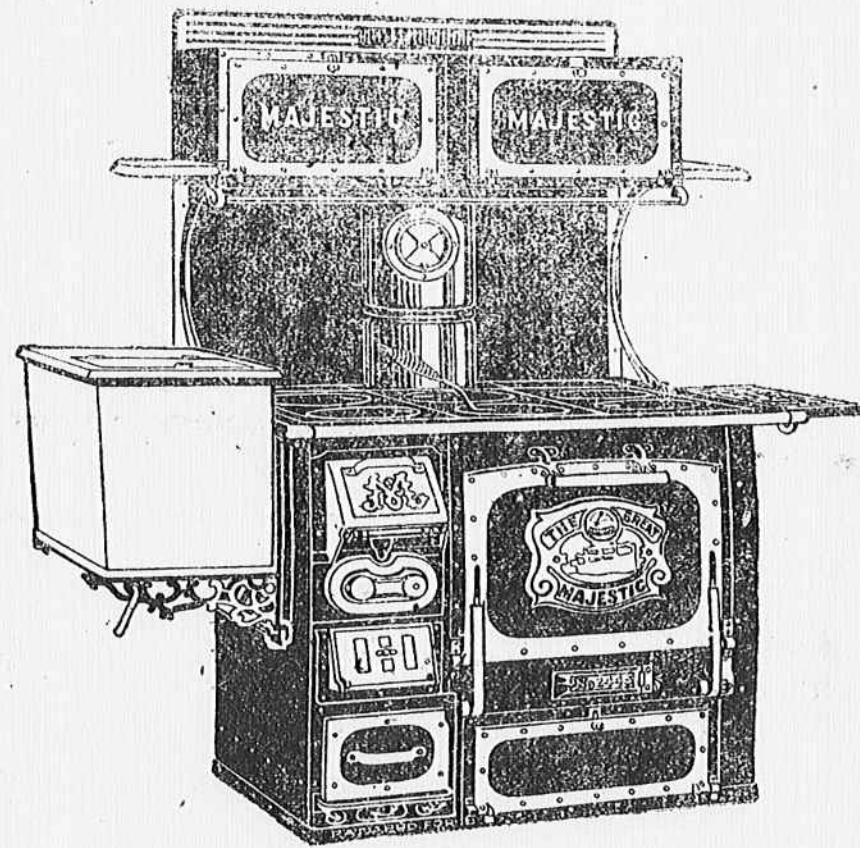
W. W. Aiken lost a horse with colic on August 6.

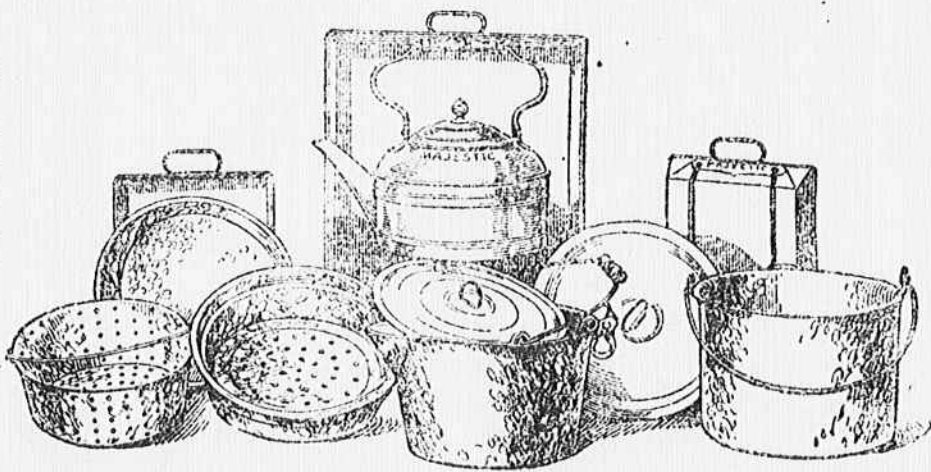
