**Tax Notice, 1917**

Office of County Treasurer, Pickens County, Pickens, S. C., October 1, 1917.

The books for the collection of State and County taxes will be open from October 15, 1917, to December 31, 1917.

Those who prefer to do so can pay in January, 1918, with 1 per cent additional. Those who prefer paying in February, 1918, can do so with 2 per cent additional. Those who prefer paying in March, 1918, to the 15th of said month can do so by paying an additional 7 per cent. After said date the books will close.

N. B.—Taxpayers owning property or paying taxes for others will please ask for tax receipt in each township or special school district in which he or they own property. This is very important, as there are so many school districts. Those who do not wish to come to the office can write, not later than the 30th of December, and I will furnish them with the amount due and they can pay me by check, money order or registered mail. If stamps are sent do not send above 2-cent denomination, as I cannot use them. Please do not send me cash without registering same, as it is liable to get lost; if sent otherwise it must be at sender's risk.
