A Rhode Island Red cockerel shown by E. H. Craig of Pickens won second prize at the state fair in Columbia last week. One of Mr. Craig's pullets also won fifth prize. The judges pronounced the chicken show at the fair the strongest ever held in the south, with one exception.

Lawrence Porter, 12-year-old son of J. H. Porter of Easley route 1, brought to The Sentinel office last week two of the largest sweet potatoes we have seen this year. Friends and neighbors succeeded in saving most of the household furniture, but Dr. Seawright's loss is considerable. Mr. Roark carried \$1,500 insurance on the building.

Ruth, the two-and-a-half-year-old child of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Stephens of the Pea Ridge section, died Friday morning, October 25th, and was buried that afternoon at Mountain View after funeral services conducted by Rev. C. R. Abernethy. Pneumonia was the cause of death. The parents have the sympathy of many friends in their great bereavement.

In their annual football game played last week in Columbia, the Clemson College team defeated the University of South Carolina team, 21 to 13. Colie Seaborn of Pickens, a member of the Carolina team, was the star of the game, making one run of 75 yards for a touchdown and several other good gains. The Columbia State says his playing was the most spectacular ever seen in Columbia.

The first road to be built by the Pickens County Highway Commission under authority granted at the last meeting of the state legislature when the county was authorized to issue \$250,000 worth of bonds for road improvement, will be the road from Norris to Catechee, and work is expected to begin this week. At a very early date it is also expected that work will begin on the road from Easley to the Anderson county line, via the Easley Cotton Mill. P. F. Patton, who has recently built nearly \$1,000,000 worth of roads in Greenville county, has accepted the position as highway engineer of Pickens county and will supervise the construction of the roads. The commission now has in hand \$253,522.25, which represents the bond issue with premium and interest from the buyers.
