MR. EDITOR:-Please give me space for the following article:

I have always felt myself too modest to make a boast of my deeds and it is not the intention of this article to make such an impression on any one. But as it seems that there are a few people who apparently feel that nothing worth mentioning in the way of roads and bridges has been accomplished in the last six or seven years, I feel it my duty and certainly a pleasant task to emind them of a few things that I nave accomplished in the past seven years, some of which they ought to know without my having to tell them.

I have had constructed twenty-two sets of concrete abutments which is 85 per cent of all the concrete of the county and about 30 per cent of both rock and cement previously constructed. In the construction of these abutments l have made earth fills and eliminated ap-

proximately 800 lineal feet of bridge floor and made considerable filling at other bridges where it was necessary to make a high-water crossing.

In addition to the above, I have been called on to do considerable line bridge repairs by Greenville and Oconee counties. Ravenel bridge, which has been expected to fall in the river for years, has been overhauled and made good under my personal supervision, and I, in If we lived in Jacksonville we could no boasting way, take the credit for saving the county a considerable sum on this job. I think I am right when I say that 80 per cent of the permanent waterways under the roads of the county has been placed under my supervision. I think less useless roads have been recommended and opened by me than by any previous supervisor. I have widened and made other valuable improvements on almost every main highway in the county and I see no signs to show that any supervisor has handled the matter of road location with more care than I have.

I have borrowed money for running expenses at as low, if not lower rate of interest than has been the custom of the county to pay. The general equipment of the county has been much im-

For the last two or three years the county has operated under a great load of high prices and I have never seen the time when operating conditions were more unfavorable

I have not done all things as I would do them again, neither have I been able to have all things done as I wanted them done, and whatever the right or the wrong, my efforts have been to improve conditions, and I promise those who would be pleased to throw obstructions in my path that if I offer for reelection this summer, I will take truth, as I have always done, for my weapon, and use it with a liberal amount of energy to slaughter rotten political schemes.

If any one is doubtful about these statements and figures, I believe that if he will talk with me on the matter I will be able to show him that they hang close to facts.
