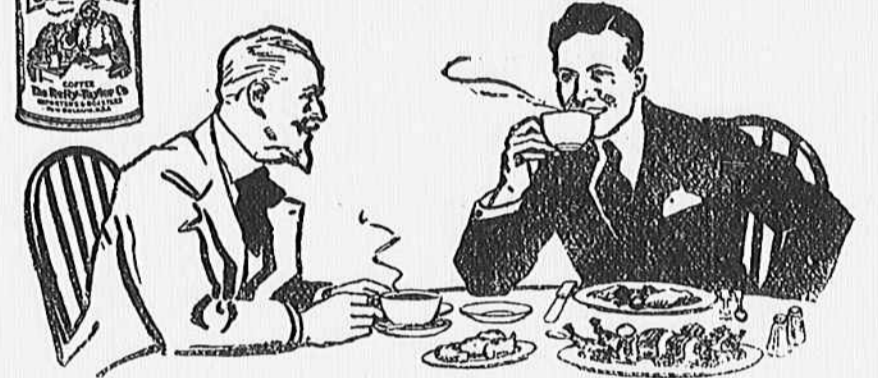
All persons having on hand surplus clothing in good condition will please send the same to the Red Cross to be used for Belgian Relief.
