# Preserve Eggs

## With Water Glass

(Solution Silicate Sodium.)

**DIRECTIONS**—Select clean fresh eggs (do not wash eggs, it injures them). Heat to the boiling point and cool nine quarts of water; to this add one quart Water Glass and mix thoroughly. This is sufficient to preserve about twelve dozen eggs. Place eggs in a crock, jar or pail, small ends down. Pour over them the solution, keeping at least two inches of the solution above the top layer of eggs at all times. Put on the cover and keep all in a cool place until required for use.

**NOTE**—When eggs taken from the solution are to be boiled, prick the shells at the large end just before boiling to prevent cracking. Fresh eggs may be saved six to ten months by this method.
