"Okeh"

The now famous "okeh," President Wilson's word of approval which in good usage is certain to supercede the nonsensical form "O. K.," has created almost as much discussion as the subject of the split infinitive. It is of interest to find that the Century Dictionary apparently slipped a cog in the spelling of the word-the correct form of which is "oke," not "okah"-and that there is a second error in spelling in the dictionary's citation from Byington's Grammar of the Choctaw language of the form of "yai okeh," meaning "Thanks to you." The grammar actually reads ''yak okeh.'

The form "oke" (meaning "it is") i to be found on page 483 of the English-Choctaw section of the official "Dictionary of the Choctaw Language, edited in 1915 by the United States Na tional Museum, Smithsonian Institution, bureau of American ethnology. "Okeh" does not appear

Apparently the first tracing of "O. " to the Choctaw language appeared vice. in the September, 1894, number of the Century Mr gazine, which is published by the editors of the Century Dictionary. In the article in that number it was suggested that "O, K." had its origin in the Choctaw "oke."

Regardless, however, of whether the spelling of the word with the final "h" is a dictionary slip, the fact remains that for all practical purposes "okeh" IF YOU don't want to work you had is the ideal form, as it easily lends itself to the spellings "okehed and "okehing," which would not be the case if THE closer the Huns get to Paris the the form "oke" were used.
