# BRITISH CAPTURE 7,000 PRISONERS

C'ERCOME E'EMY ON WHOLE FRONT AND THE ADVANCE CONTINUES UNCHECKED.

### OBSTINATE RESISTANCE MET

Germans Defending With Stubborn Determination the Crossings of Ecaillon River.

London.-The British troops have overcome the enemy along the whole, front between the Sambre canal and the Scheldt and their advance is being continued, Field Marshal Haig reports from headquarters.

In twenty-four hours the British have taken 7,000 prisoners and more than 100 guns.

The text of the statement reads: "Our battle front was extended northward as far as the Scheldt at Thiant. On the whole battle front between the Sambre canal and the Scheldt, the enemy resistance was overcome and our advance continued. There was hard fighting at a number of points.

"On the left of our attack Anglo-Scottish troops forced crogsings of the Ecaillon, between Verchain and Thiant, and gained the high ground to the east.

"We have taken the villages of Poix du Nord and Les Tulleries and progressed beyond them toward Englefontaine. The village of Ghissignies was taken after a sharp struggle, the enemy defending with determination the crossings of the Ecaillon in that vicinity.

"Northwest of Ghissignies we have secured the river crossings at Beaudignies, which is in our hands. Here, vigorous resistance was overcome by the New Zealanders, who in this locality captured a number of batteries, including guns of heavy caliber.

"We have reached the general line of the Sambre-Oise canal, due east of LeCateau; west of the edge of the Forest de Mormal in the neighborhood of LeQuesnoy, Vendegies-Sur-Ecaillon and the Scheldt canal at Maing.

"In local fighting on the Valenciennes-Tournal sector we have made progress and taken prisoners."

#### MOOSEVELT PITS HIS WISDOM AGAINST THAT OF WORLD

Oyster Bay, N. Y .- Theodore Roosevelt sent duplicate telegrams to United States Senators Lodge, Poindexter and Johnson, in which he characterized as "thorougly mischievous" the 14 principles enunciated by President Wilson, if they are to be made the basis of peace. The telegrams follow:

"As an American citizen, I most earnestly hope that the senate of the 14 Is a Power ul Tonic and Appetizer Will care that the series of the United States, which is part of the units and head. Contains no quinine, treaty-making power of the United States, will take shirmative action States, will take affirmative action against a negotiated peace with Germany and in favor of a peace based on the unconditional surrender of Germany.

"I also declare against the adoption in their entirety of the 14 points. of the President's a idress of last January as offering a basis for a peace satisfactory to the United States. Let us dictate peace by the hammering guns and not chat rbout peace to the accompaniment of the clicking of typewriters.

"The language of the 14 points and the subsequent statements explaining or qualifying them is neither straightforward nor plain, but if construed in its probable sense many, and possibly most of these 14 points are thoroughly mischievous and if made the basis of a peace, such peace would represent, not the unconditional surrender of Germany, but the unconditional surrender of the United States. Naturally they are entirely satisfactory to Germany and equally naturally they are in this country satisfactory to every pro-German and pacifist and socialist and anti-American so-called internationalist."

#### AMERICAN AVIATORS DROP BOMBS BEHIND ENEMY LINES

North of Grand Pre.-- In the sector lyong between the Meuse river and north of the Argonne forest, the Americans have cut further, and deeply, into the enemy's line, despite the continued extremely heavy use of machine guns and artillery by the Germans. Amercian aviators are droppnig bombs behind the enemy lines, while enemy airmen are returning the compliment by bombing towns inside of the American front.

#### HUNGARIAN INDEPENDENCE AND A SEPARATE PEACE

Amsterdam.—Advices received from Budapest say that in the Unterhaus Count Karolyi, in moving a resolution in favor of the independence of Hungary, demanded the resignation of the Wekerle cabinet and the formation of a coalition ministry. The resolution also called for the conclusion of a separate peace, dissolution of the alliance with Germany and the proclamation of a Hungarian king to reside in Buda-

# TO LAST HUN NOTE

ARMIES IN FIELD MUST MAKE VIRTUAL SURRENDER BEFORE ARMISTICE IS CONSIDERED.

## SAFEGUARDS ARE DEMANDED

People Have No Means of Forcing Military Authorities to Agree to Any Plans for Peace.

Wash:ngton.-President Wilson has submitted the German plea for an armistice and peace to the allies, and at the same time has informed Berlin that there can be no armistice except upon terms that would make it impossible for Germany to renew hostili-

While consenting to deal further with the present authorities in Germany, the President has given them this warning:

"If it (the United States) must deal with the military masters and monarchical autocrats of Germany now, or if it is likely to have to deal with them later in regard to the international obligations of the German empire, it must demand, not peace negotiations, but surrender. Nothing can be gained by leaving this essential thing unsaid."

The President's reply to the last German note was handed to the charge of the Swiss legation for transmission to the German government. It accedes to the request that he take up with the allies the proposals of the new spokesmen of the German people, but does it with notice that virtual surrender of the Teutonic armies in the field will be the price demanded for interruption of the beating now being administered.

In transmitting the matter to the allies, the President says he has suggested that if they are disposed to effect peace on his terms and principles now accepted by the present German authorities, the American and allied military advisers be asked. if they deem such an armistice possible from a military point of view, to submit such terms as will fully protect the interests of the peoples involved and insure to the associated governments the unrestricted power to enforce

GERMANS TOWARD BORDER The allied armies in France and

Belgium are still driving the Germans toward their border, but the process is now comparatively slow.

Paricularly vicious fighting is in progress west of the Meuse river, where the Americans, in their endeavors to overcome the natural obstacles barring the way northward to Sedan, are faced by picked troops with orders to hold them back at all costs; in the region from LeCateau to the north to Valenciennes.

Veritable nests of machine guns are being encountered by the Americans as they attempt to press forward along the front from the Meuse to the town of Grand Pre, situated north of the Argenne forest, but in spite of these obstacles they have taken further ground and at last accounts were steadily keeping up their pressure.

In northern Belgium the Germans are still retiring. Unofficial reports are to the effect that Ghent is being evacuated.

#### BRITISH SMASHING THROUGH GERMAN STRONG DEFENSIVE

With the British Army in France fourth armies smashed through strong German defensive positions south of Valenciennes . They gained ground to a depth of more than 5,000 yards on an extended front, capturing many important villages and several thousand prisoners. The fighting was desperate, the German machine gunners holding out to the last.

#### SPECTACULAR COMBAT PULLED OFF BY AMERICAN AVIATORS

With the American Army North west of Verdun.-In a most spectacular combat over Doulcon, which last ed half an hour four American fight ers badly worsted an equal number of Germans, three Fokkers being downed.
