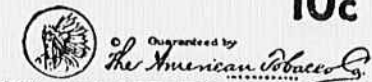

The officers made a raid in Yadkin county one night this week and located a plant in full operation though the owners disappeared when they heard the intruders coming. The plant was found about three miles from Yadkinville and after shutting down the machinery, the officers made an investigation, which revealed a sack of fine horse manure. Inspecting the mash on hand, it was found to contain some of the manure, which, the revenue men say is used by moonshiners to give the whiskey an aged-looking color.
