

TWELVE MILL LEVY FOR STATE TAXES.

Comptroller General Determines Amount.

The tax levy for 1921, as determined by Walter E. Duncan, comptroller general, and announced Saturday, is 11 1/2 mills. To this is added the one-half mill for The Citadel, provided in the acts of 1920, making a total levy for state purposes of 12 mills.

This is the same as the levy for 1920. In determining the levy for the current year the comptroller general has found it necessary to fix this at the maximum provided in the appropriation bill and gives the following figures as the basis of his calculation:

Total amount appropriated for 1921, \$6,534,945.82; less revenue from sources other than taxes, 1921 (estimated), \$1,035,000.00; amount to be raised by taxation, \$5,499,925.82.

Total taxable property 1920, \$148,222,786.00; estimated increase over 1920, \$30,000,000.00; total taxable property, 1921, \$478,222,786.00.

Levy of 11 1/2 mills, \$5,499,925.82.

As will be seen by these figures, even the maximum levy will fall short by a few dollars of producing the total amount it will be necessary to raise by taxation, assuming that the revenues from other sources and increase in taxable property for the present year will be as large as the comptroller general has estimated.

NEW SUPERINTENDENT FOR LIBERTY SCHOOLS.

L. N. Foy, for the past three years with the Simpsonville public schools, has resigned as superintendent there, effective at the close of the present session, to accept the position of superintendent of the schools of Liberty.

Mr. Foy will succeed E. B. Hallman, of Spartanburg, a very popular superintendent, who is returning to his home because of his father's ill health. Mr. Foy's successor in Simpsonville has not yet been named but probably will be elected within a few days.

Mr. Foy's Simpsonville friends, while regretting to see him leave that town, are congratulating him in view of the fact that his new position is in the nature of a promotion. Liberty is making rapid strides in the improvement of schools. A magnificent new plant is now being completed and, within a short time, the authorities there expect to have one of the best equipped schools in the state.

Mr. Foy is a graduate of Furman and is recognized as a man of uncommon ability.

SENDS OUT AID TO HIGH SCHOOLS.

One Hundred and Forty Eight Approved White High Schools Being Maintained in State.

State high school aid in the sum of \$250,708 was paid out Saturday to 150 approved high schools in the 45 counties of the state, according to J. E. Swearingen, state superintendent of education. The money was forwarded to the county treasurers to be credited to the beneficiary school districts. Disbursement to the teachers will be made by the local boards of district trustees.

"The high school situation is improving annually," said Mr. Swearingen. "The list this year comprises 146 districts maintaining 148 white and 14 colored high schools. Sumter and Charleston maintain separate high schools for boys and for girls.

The total enrollment was 14,874 taught by 658 teachers. Outside pupils coming mainly from rural communities numbered 3,112. In one high school averaging 15 pupils per high school instructor, the state pays tuition for these outsiders at the rate of \$3 per month. This tuition payment was earned by 2,459 pupils and amounted to \$58,215.

VALUE OF A TECHNICAL EDUCATION.

SCHOLARSHIPS AND EXAMINATIONS.

The college maintains one hundred and seventy four-year scholarships in the Agricultural and Textile Courses. Each scholarship means \$100 to help pay expenses and \$160 for tuition apportioned equally over the four years.

Also fifty-two scholarships in the One Year Agricultural Course, these scholarships are worth \$100 and tuition of \$40. The scholarships must be won by competitive examinations which are held by each County Superintendent of Education on July 8th. It is worth your while to try for one of these scholarships.

Credit for examinations passed at the county seat will be given to those who are not applying for scholarships but for entrance.

R. O. T. C.—Clemson is a member of the senior division of the Reserve Officers Training Corps. All R. O. T. C. students receive financial assistance from the Federal Government, this reaching about \$200 per year during the junior and senior classes.
