

**PICKENS MILL IS ALL HOME AFFAIR**

Progress is to be seen on every side at the Pickens mill village, water and lights having been installed in every home and a number of new residences recently erected. Since the installation of the water and sewage system several months ago the health of the village has greatly improved, according to the superintendent, A. J. Jewell.

The Pickens mill is a Pickens county affair, being controlled by Pickens county officials, operated by Pickens county folk and using Pickens county cotton exclusively.

About 22 persons are employed in the mill, which has a total of 23,000 spindles and 606 looms.

Many families have been here since the mill was established in 1907. In addition to these, there are many families who have been here for a number of years, never having left since taking up their abode here.

"We train our own help," Superintendent Jewell said, "and while we usually have to take some time in doing this, we find it pays in the long run. All of our help came from this section and the most of it from out of the mountains. Once trained in mill work they make the best kind of workers. We never have had the slightest suggestion of labor trouble here and all of our help seems happy and satisfied."

The Pickens mill band has recently been re-organized and new instruments purchased. The leader is Lonnie Bowen.

The village has its own school and approximately 125 pupils are enrolled. The teachers are Misses Estner Edens, Ruth Cannon and Mrs. A. W. Hammonds.

The Baptist church has a fair sized membership, the pastor being the Rev. C. R. Abernethy.

The officials of the Pickens mill are W. M. Hagood, president; C. B. Hagood, vice president and general manager; A. J. Jewell, a product of the Pickens mills, superintendent.

Until this season all cotton used at the local mill was brought here, it was stated. This fall cotton has been purchased in other towns in the county, but even then all cotton used in Pickens mill is grown in this county.

**WORD "MAVERICK" GIVEN TO ENGLISH LANGUAGE BY CENTRAL MAN**

F. R. Morgan of Central, S. C., one of the towns along the "Keowee Trail" in a letter to the pageant office writes of the history of the word "maverick," as follows:

"Samuel Maverick was born in Charleston, S. C., and lived within a few miles of the present town of Central, S. C. He is buried in a private burying ground within a hundred yards of his old home. Mr. Maverick was one of the early settlers of this country. He was the owner of lots of cattle and I have heard it said that he had cattle from here to the West. At any rate cattle in those days were branded and as Mr. Maverick was such a large owner cattle found wild and bearing no marks became known as Maverick's. Today this is a perfectly good American word and may be found in any standard dictionary. I thought that this might be of interest to those who live in the Piedmont section—we not only make history but have contributed to our language in this section I wish you much success in this undertaking. We are about as low in the scale appreciating our local history as we are from an educational standpoint in illiteracy. May the time soon come when we will know and appreciate more of the beautiful history of the Piedmont section of South Carolina.—Greenville Piedmont.

**AN ORDINANCE**

An Ordinance To Raise Money For Paying The Interest On The Bonded Indebtedness Of The CITY OF PICKENS And To Create A Sinking Fund To Retire Said Bonds And To Raise Money For The Current Expenses.

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Pickens, South Carolina, in Council assembled and by the authority of the same.

Section 1.—That a levy of eight (8) mills is hereby levied on all taxable property in the City of Pickens for the purpose of paying the interest on the Water Works and Sewer Bonds and to create a sinking fund to retire said Bonds.

Section 2.—That a levy of twelve (12) mills is hereby levied on all taxable property in the City of Pickens for the purpose of raising money to meet the current expenses, for the fiscal year ending November 1st 1921.

Section 3.—That the Tax Books for the City of Pickens shall be opened in the office of the City Clerk on the 1st day of November, 1921, for the purpose of collecting all taxes due on that date within the City of Pickens and shall remain open continuously from said date without penalty until the 1st day of January, 1922; that on and after the 1st day of January 1922 a penalty of five (5) per cent, shall be assessed on levied against all taxes not then paid. Done and ratified in Council assembled this the 26th, day of October 1921.
