Progress is to be seen on every side at the Pickens mill village, water and lights having been installed in every home and a number of new residences recently erected. Since the installa tien of the water and sewage system several menths ago the health of the village has greatly improved, according to the superintendent, A. J Jewell.

The Pickens mill is a Pickens county affair, being controlled by Calhoun Hinton, Pickens county officials, operated by Pickens county folk and using Pick ens county cotton exclusively.

About 22 persons are employed in the mill, which has a total of 23,000 spindles and 606 looms.

"We train our own help." Superintendent Jewell said, "and while we usually have to take some time in doing this, we find it pays in the long ion. All of our help came from this section and the most of it from out of the mountains. Once trained in mill work they make the best kind of workers. We never have had the slighest suggestion of labor trouble here and all of our help seems happy and satisfied."
