

MODERN METHODS KEEP AUTOS NEW

Several Excellent Liquid and Wax Polishes on Market Give Admirable Results.

SPRAYER USEFUL ON SURFACE

Owner Must Not Assume That New and Helpful Aids in Beautifying Have Superseded Water—Cars Must Be Washed.

The present-day owner using modern methods may keep his car looking new for a long time, nor will he have to spend more than a few moments a day to wash this end. For instance, there are now on the market a number of liquid and wax polishes which will give admirable results if they are used as directed.

In the use of wax polishes the first step is to clean the body of the car thoroughly. The polish is applied to the surface with a piece of cheese cloth and then another clean cloth is used to distribute the wax evenly all over the surface. Car owners commonly make the mistake of thinking that the more wax applied the better. As a matter of fact a very thin film is all that is needed. The polish will last for from four days to a week, and after it has been applied at the beginning of the week a little rubbing with a clean cloth will bring out the luster again. The wax polish may be used for body, fenders, hood and other lustrous surfaces and it will also be found that if the under side of the fenders is cleaned and given a good coating of wax less mud will be deposited and what is there may be easily removed.

Spray Polish.
The most recent type of body polish is that which is sprayed on the surface with a large sprayer. In using this polish the body must be thoroughly cleaned with water. If the body surfaces are merely dusty the polish may be sprayed on and then be wiped off with a clean cloth. After spraying the polish over the surface a piece of cheesecloth is used to wipe off the excess.

The present-day owner must not assume that these new and really useful aids to beautifying the motorcar have superseded plain water. The contrary is true. The car must be washed just as formerly, after which the new polishes will bring out the luster of the original finish.

Soap should never be used on the body except for removing grease or oil spots. A small piece of soft cloth, well covered with castile soap suds, serves very well to remove grease from the panels. The hood should never be washed while it is hot, as this will result in discoloration. In cleaning the radiator send a stream of water from the front, to keep mechanism moist.

A clean chamolais rubbing being done in straight lines. If spots of tar or road oil are found on the body it is best to treat them with salt, butter or kerosene. The butter softens the deposit so that it may be wiped off easily. Kerosene should be applied locally and wiped off within a minute.

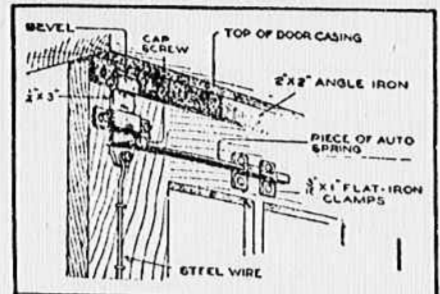
To keep pace with the improved appearance of the body it is necessary to give some attention to the top and the upholstery. A weekly brushing of the top inside and out will aid materially in its life. Fabric tops should never be cleaned with gasoline, kerosene or other oils, as they tend to destroy the rubber in the top. Castile soap and water applied with a stiff brush is the best cleansing medium for the top.

GARAGE-DOOR LATCH UNUSUALLY DURABLE

Good Plan to Put One on That Will Last for Years.

Device Shown in Illustration Has Been Used With Satisfaction and Requires No Expensive Materials in Making.

It is a good idea to provide a large garage door with a good, heavy latch, put on in such a way that it will last for many years and will resist the efforts of thieves. The latch illustrated has been used with satisfaction, and requires no materials for its construction except some scraps of bar iron, a few bolts or cap screws, some steel wire, and a leaf from an old automobile spring. It is, however, well to get a piece of two-inch angle iron.

POOR PACKING CAUSES LEAK

Excessive Squeezing of Candle Wick or Other Material Is Apt to Cause Trouble.

When the water pump begins leaking do not assume that necessarily it is because the nut is too loose. Frequently the nut is not to blame at all, but poor packing is the real cause of the trouble. Packing for this part consists of candle wick soaked in tallow, heavy twine similarly treated, or special packing material. After the nut has been turned to press the packing down do not turn it further, as excessive squeezing is apt to damage some part of the body of the pump.

AUTOMOBILE GOSSIP

Don't use gasoline to clean leather unless you want to crack it.

When ball bearings become worn it is not always necessary to have complete new bearings installed. The old ones can be repaired and be almost as good as new.

An empty oil can, in addition to the regular equipment, is a good thing to carry in the car. It may be filled with gasoline for priming the cylinders or cleaning spark plugs.

A simple but frequently forgotten precaution in regard to filling the gasoline tank is that the mouth of the gasoline can should be carefully wiped off before filling to remove any dust or dirt that may have lodged there.

Just polishing up the points when cleaning a spark plug is entirely insufficient. Remove all the carbon from the porcelain or mica by washing them in a solution of gasoline.

ISAIAH'S SUMMONS AND RESPONSE.

LESSON TEXT.—Isa. 6:1-13.
GOLDEN TEXT.—Here am I; send me.—Isa. 6:8.

REFERENCE MATERIAL.—Gen. 12:1-4; Ex. 3:1-4:17; Josh. 1:1-9; Jer. 1:4-10; Matt. 10:5-28.
PRIMARY TOPIC.—God Calls Isaiah to Help Him.
JUNIOR TOPIC.—A Young Man Who Was Ready.
INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC.—Our Response to the Call for Service.
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC.—The Service to Which God Calls Us.

1. Isaiah's Vision of Glory (vv. 1-4).
So definite was this vision that the prophet remembered the very time of its occurrence. It meant so much to him that he could ever look back to it as a day when his ministry took on a new meaning.

1. He Saw the Lord on His Throne (v. 1). Though the death of Uzziah left Judah's throne empty it was made clear to the prophet that the throne of God was occupied. The Lord was high and lifted up, showing that He is above all kingdoms. This was a peculiar preparation of Isaiah for his work. The one who has really seen God can never be the same again; life has a fuller meaning ever afterward.

2. He Saw the Seraphims Above (vv. 2, 3). Just who these beings are we do not know. The word signifies "fiery," "burning." They were glorious beings whose business was to wait upon the Lord, to go on errands for Him. They had six wings—two for flight; two to cover their face, showing reverence; and two to cover their feet, showing humility. These three pairs show that reverence and humility are of equal value before God, with activity. The song of the seraphims shows that they saw holiness as God's supreme attribute. The thrice "holy" perhaps refers to the Trinity. The first choir sang, "Holy, holy, holy," and the second choir responded to this by saying, "The whole earth is full of His glory."

3. The Manifestation of Majesty (v. 4). "The posts of the door moved at the voice of him that cried, and the house was filled with smoke." The smoke, no doubt, signified God's wrath against man's sinfulness (see Psalms 18:8; 74:1).

II. Isaiah's Conviction of Sin (v. 6).
The vision of God brought the prophet to see himself. It is only in the light of God's holiness that we see our unholiness. When Peter got a glimpse of who Christ was he begged Him to depart from him, saying, "Depart from me; for I am a sinful man, O Lord" (Luke 5:3). The prophet not only realized that he was a sinner, but that the nation was a nation of sinners. What the world needs today above all things is a vision of God.

III. Isaiah's Cleansing From Sin (vv. 6, 7).
The taking of the coal from the altar shows that it was connected with sacrifice. The fire that consumed the sacrifice was holy fire. When a sinner gets a vision of God in Christ, the Holy Spirit applies the merits of Christ's shed blood and cleanses from all sin.

IV. Isaiah's Call (v. 8).
Immediately following his cleansing came the call. Men must be cleansed from sin before they shall be called to God's service. Though God has many angelic beings who willingly go on errands for Him, yet He has errands upon which only cleansed human beings can go. The only ones who can really declare the gospel of God's grace are those who have experienced its saving power. God is asking this same question of men and women. Isaiah readily responded to his call by dedicating himself to the task. He said, "Here am I; send me."

V. Isaiah's Commission (vv. 9-13).

1. The Sending (vv. 9, 10). He had a most discouraging task before him. He is assured that the people will hear his message, but be unmoved by it. They will even increase in blindness and deafness to the divine warnings—they will neither be converted nor healed. Such a hopeless task would only be undertaken by one who had had a vision of God.

2. The Encouragement (vv. 11-13). Facing this discouraging outlook the prophet raised the inquiry, "Lord, how long?" The Lord in His reply assured him that it would not last forever. The land would be desolate, the cities without inhabitants, and the houses without occupants; but as the oak retains its vital substance even long after it has been cut down, so from Judah shall a remnant be saved. The holy seed is the substance which shall constitute the basis of the kingdom which shall come when David's son shall be king.

Must Look to Jesus.

If I want to repent, if I want to change my mind and get more and more determined to be good, I must look at Jesus Christ, I must notice how perfectly faultless, perfectly loving, perfectly patient, perfectly ready to spend Himself in the service of others, He is.—The Bishop of London.

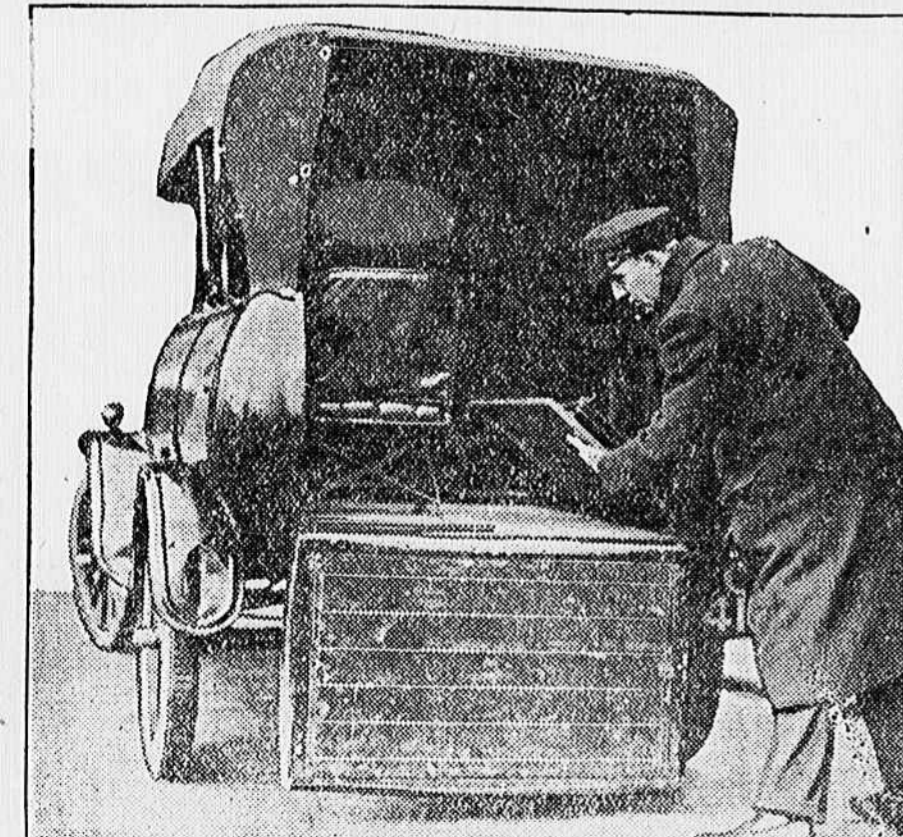
