Thomas G. McLeod was nominated for governor over Cole L. Blease in the second primary on September 12 Ly a majority of 14,280, according to the official tabulation of figures by H. N. Edmunds, secretary of the state Democratic executive committee, Monday.

Mr. Edmunds' figures show that Mr. 85,834 for Mr. Blease. All the figures were official.

The total vote cast in the race for governor was 185,948, the largest ever polled in a Democratic primary in South Carolina, being 12,383 more than in the first primary.

# BALLEW AGAIN IN ATTEMPTED ESCAPE

Columbia, Sept. 12 .-- Penitentiary authorities nipped another attempted escape in the bud yesterday at 12:30 clock when they discovered two prisoners ready to leave through a window in the chair factory. The bars had been sawed and in another minute the two men would have been gone, Capt. C. C. Roberts, head of the guard, said yesterday afternoon.

The men were C. D. Cooper, sent up from Marlboro county for life on a charge of murder, and Wade H. Ballew, sent up from Pickens county on a manslaughter charge. Both Cooper and Ballew have been in other attempted escapes and were in stripes yesterday for one of these offenses. They were both in the recent riot at the prison.

Yesterday at the noon hour the men "checked" out of the chair factory and one was found missing at the time. A few minutes later Captain Roberts was "tipped off" that the two were hiding out and he stationed a guard on the outside near the canal bank to watch developments. Other guards went into the chair faccompletely sawed out and ready for an escape.
