Dr. J. L. Vailey recently planted a small experimental field of alfalfa on his Gauley mountain place about twelve miles above Pickens. The seed were planted under the supervision of County Agent Bowen, and if the experiment shows that alfalfa niay be grown profitably in that section Dr. Valley intends to plant his bottom land of about twenty acres with alfalfa seed.

If the doctor successfully introduces the growing of this valuable crop in the mountain section of Pickens county he will have performed a valuable service to the county.

Dr. Valley's place is a part of Gauley mountain and a small valley between Gaulcy and Mount Pinnacle. Mount Pinnacle is the highest mountain peak in South Carolina, reach ing a height of about 3600 feet above sea level, and is known locally as Bald Knob.
