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Dr. J. L. Valley recently planted a small experimental field of alfalfa on his Gauley mountain place about twelve miles above Pickens. The seed were planted under the supervision of County Agent Bowen, and if the experiment shows that alfalfa may be grown profitably in that section Dr. Valley intends to plant his bottom land of about twenty acres with alfalfa seed.

If the doctor successfully introduces the growing of this valuable crop in the mountain section of Pickens county he will have performed a valuable service to the county.

Dr. Valley's place is a part of Gauley mountain and a small valley between Gauley and Mount Pinnacle. Mount Pinnacle is the highest mountain peak in South Carolina, reaching a height of about 3600 feet above sea level, and is known locally as Bald Knob. The house on the place is twelve miles above Pickens, is situated on a lovely level spot between two cool and crystal streams only a few hundred feet from the base of and within the shadow of Bald Knob which rises towering and majestic like as if a mighty sentinel on guard. However, in order to reach the top of the peak one must travel by foot-path some four or five miles from the house. At one time, it is said, a wagon road led to the top of the peak and some portions of the old road are now plainly visible. There is no drinking water on Bald Knob, so when one makes the trip up a bottle of water should be carried along.

In the summer time one cannot get a good view from the topmost peak, because the foliage obstructs the view, but a point about half way to the top affords one of the most magnificent views that ever greeted mortal eyes. From this point one may, with the aid of field glasses, distinguish buildings at Greer, Greenville, Easley, Liberty, Norris and Pickens and smoke from the Wauhatchie mill is plainly visible and the vast expanse of country as far as the eye can reach is dotted with residences, barns, school houses and country stores. As one first gazes out upon the magnificent and awe-inspiring scene it seems so vast and wonderful that he is overcome by the thought of his own insignificance as compared with these mighty works of God and nature. As mountain peak after peak and valley after valley, with the seemingly endless expanse of level land beyond becomes a panorama unfolded before one's eyes the sight is indescribable and leaves one speechless in awe with admiration. We doubt if a finer panoramic view can be obtained anywhere in the country than from this point on the side of Bald Knob. If a tower could be built on the summit of the mountain so that one could look out from above the trees the view no doubt would be even grander.

On Dr. Valley's place is one of the very old apple orchards which many years ago could be found throughout our mountain section. There are many trees of different varieties, and although the orchard has had no attention for years and years the trees are still bearing fruit of great quantity and fine quality. Numbers of the trees now have on them from ten to twenty bushels of apples each.

There is no doubt but that this is a natural apple country. Incidentally, Mr. T. A. Bowen says that he brought an apple that measured sixteen inches around out of the Reedy Cove country several weeks ago, and there are plenty more like it up there.

The reason the apple industry has not been developed in that section is because of lack of good roads to market. With the advent of good roads opening up the mountain sections of the county no doubt the apple industry will be developed into a prominent and profitable business and add much wealth to the county.

The upper portions of Pickens county have long been neglected, but now they are going to come into their own, and with their great natural advantages and resources developed the enrichment which results will not be of local effect alone but felt over the entire county.

The building of good roads into and across the mountains of Pickens county is going to prove the best investment the county has made since bonds were issued for building of the Southern railway.

Some Horry tobacco growers have cleared more than one thousand dollars on their tobacco crops which ranged from two to four acres in size.
