VETERAN FOX HUNTER MOUNTAIN PICKENS, S. C. PASSING OF FAVORITE HOUS

Greenville News. Central.—R. G. ("Lam") Pickens, 72-year old resident of Central is perhaps the leading fox hunter of the state in the number of chases engaged in the game bagged and the number of years on the hunting trails Dixieland.

Since he was a boy about the foothills of Pickens county, Mr. Pickens has felt a supreme thrill in following a pack of hounds and each year has engaged in a number of hunts. This year, for the first time, Mr. Pickens has taken but little part in hunting, although he has ordered a number of fox from Florida, which he expects to liberate between now and the Christmas holidays.

The fact that he is 72 years of age is not the principal reason that Mr. Pickens has taken but little part in fox hunting this fall. He is still hale and hearty and one would never take him to be three score and twelve years of age. It is sentiment more than any other which prevents the feeling of enthusiasm on mention of the chase, as was formerly the case.

The chief executive is being besieged with requests for Christmas paroles in order that prisoners may dine with their families here or over the state. However, the governor does not intend to grant any of these requests. He does not feel that he should show favoritism to a few to the exclusion of the vast majority. To let a dozen go home would mean favoritism to them and would not tend to build up the discipline of the other 490 or more, the governor says.

In connection with his idea as to the treatment of the prisoners, the governor made the following statement: "The governor stands for absolute humaneness in the handling of the prisoners, but he believes in punishment where there are offenders, just as children have to be punished if they violate the ordinary rules of home life. He stands for giving the prisoners every reasonable consideration, looking to their having the necessities of life, but he regards the penitentiary as a place of punishment and the verdict of the courts, looking to the men being placed there for a special time, should be carried out with only such exemptions as are pertinent proper and right. In order that there should be no misunderstanding of the situation the governor is making this announcement in advance."

Whiskey Cases Triable Twice. The supreme court again held that conviction of violating the prohibition laws in the federal court does not bar trial and conviction in the state court on the same charge and on facts arising out of the same transaction. The court affirmed the conviction of Arthur Moseley and Calvin Spencer in Cherokee county for violating the whiskey laws after they had been convicted on the federal court and had served sentences imposed by the federal court.

Spencer and Moseley entered a plea of former conviction when they were arraigned in the state court, alleging that the state and federal authorities had concurrent powers and jurisdiction. The presiding judge overruled the plea and the two men were convicted and sentenced. They appealed to the supreme court in an opinion written by Chief Justice Gary affirmed the action of the presiding judge in overruling the plea. Several cases have been decided similar to this in past decisions.

The court affirmed the verdict of involuntary manslaughter against T. J. Tally, of Anderson county, and he will have to serve two years. Tally was indicted for the murder of Irale Brown. He claimed Brown was trying to get a pistol away from him to kill Rich Wynn when he fell and the revolver was discharged, killing Brown.

Norman Boliver May Be Paroled. Governor Harvey has under consideration the case of Norman Boliver, the Orangeburg county man convicted of attempted criminal assault, and will likely take some action within a few days, possibly extending clemency. Boliver was all but paroled by Governor Cooper the day Mr. Cooper resigned as chief executive, the papers having been made out, but for some reason never recorded in the office of the secretary of state. They were later destroyed, it is understood.

Five Road Projects Finished. During the past month five projects were completed by the state highway department, the total length being approximately 34 miles. The actual mileage graded was about 25 miles and that surfaced 34 miles.

Expenditures for the month amounted to approximately \$391,000. Among the projects completed was the Waterce River bridge at Garner's ferry in Richland. A 15-mile section of road in Dorchester county and an 11-mile section of road in Chesterfield county were completed.

Money is made from the time they are given access to the feed mill until three months of age may be cared in these stanchions when partaking of their meals. Blueprints of these stanchions may be had by addressing requests to the dairy division, United States Department of Agriculture, Washington, already in testimony to the remarkable cheapness and value of these home-made stanchions, there are hundreds of them in service, faithfully duplicating the structural outline of the dairy engineer of this federal department.

CUT-OVER WOODLOT FAVORED

Value Increased in After Years by Taking Out Defective and Undesirable Trees.

The owner of a farm woodlot who is looking to the future as well as to the present will prefer what is known as "an improvement cutting" to a less systematic harvesting of his timber crop, forestry specialists declare. They say that it will pay the farmer to leave standing a considerable percentage of those kinds of trees which he wants to encourage in his woodlot. These trees will seed the soil and fill up the gaps left by the cutting.

All logging operations should be made with the preservation and extension of the stand of young growth in mind.

It is considered a good practice at the first cutting to remove trees like the chestnut, aspen, ironwood and beech, since they are considered less desirable and satisfactory in New York woodlots.

Stag-headed, butt-injured and heavy foliaged, limby trees of every variety may likewise be disposed of at the first cutting.

White pine, white ash, basswood, red oak, hard maple, tulip, poplar, and in some cases even hemlock should be encouraged.

A special warning is given against making the first cutting too heavy. It is said to be better to make this first cutting most carefully and if desirable to go over the woodlot again in five or ten years. If the first cutting is too heavy, it may result in a tangle of brambles which will retard all development.

POISON FOR POCKET GOPHERS

Most Excellent Plan for Eradication of Pests as Bounty Men Leave Few Animals.

In 15 years an Oregon farmer paid out \$2,500 in bounties on pocket gophers, at 25 cents apiece, for 1750 acres of land cleared of those pests. His private opinion was that the bounty men always left a few animals so that they could come back again. A demonstrator of the biological survey of the United States Department of Agriculture visited this man's farm and showed him how to use poison. The cost of the first application was \$1.50 for poison and \$21 for labor for seven days' time. A second application is yet to be made to complete eradication, but after the first application only one fresh gopher mound could be found.

GIVE MACHINERY GOOD CARE

When Exposed to Open Weather It Deteriorates Quickly—Prevent Action of Rust.

One of man's chief obligations on earth seems to be to see that something is done to combat some of the hostile and destructive forces of nature. It must be done, else we lose much in money, time and property. All kinds of machinery, when exposed to the open weather, must be protected in some way to hinder and, if possible, prevent the action of rust—that destructive formation on metal which is so expensive and such a bother. You need but three elements to form rust, and these are iron, water and air.

DOES NOT CAUSE SOUR SOILS

No Ground for Common Belief That Use of Acid Phosphate Will Prove Injurious.

Contrary to popular belief, the use of acid phosphate will not produce acidity in the soils, according to a statement made by the workers in the field of agronomy at the New York state college of agriculture at Ithaca. The college long has advocated a greater use of acid phosphate with or without manure for fertilizing soils. Some farmers, however, have feared that to do this would mean that greatly increased quantities of limestone or lime would then be required for the growth of clover and alfalfa.

These fears, however, are groundless, it is stated. Indeed, experiments made at Rhode Island show that acid phosphate actually served to reduce soil acidity. Dr. Burgess, who made the test, declares positively that "there is no foundation for the statement that soils will become more acid from the continuous use of acid phosphate."

The soil specialists state, however, that sour soil should be limed in advance of the application of acid phosphate. "Do not fear soil acidity from the use of acid phosphate," conclude the workers at Cornell, who add that with legumes and manure about 200 pounds of acid phosphate a year, on an average, when used for grain and hay crops, give excellent results.

REMOVE TRASH FROM GARDEN

Best Plan to Gather It Up and Turn It—Fertility Can Be Maintained by Manuring.

It is perhaps best to remove trash from the garden and burn it, because fertility can be maintained through the application of manure and fertilizers. Although diseases cannot be controlled entirely by this method, the burning will assist in keeping them in check. The garden, of course, should be plowed in the fall to permit early working. This will also assist in insect and disease control.

LIME REQUIRED IN GARDENS

Scatter Showful or Two of Material Into Compost Heap—Easy Way of Applying.

As the leaves, lawn clippings, vegetable leaves, and stalks are raked up and thrown into piles to be composted during the winter, scatter in a shovel or two of lime. Lime is often needed in gardens more than fertilizer materials, and this is one of the easiest ways of applying it. Ground limestone may be bought at a low price at building material yards.

BURN RUBBISH FROM GARDEN

Excellent Plan to Destroy Injurious Insects and Prevent Many Plant Diseases

Many plant diseases and injurious insects live over winter in the dead stalks of garden vegetables and other refuse left after the cropping season is over. The best plan is to rake up this material together, and when dry set a match to it. While some organic matter will be destroyed, much trouble for next year will be obviated.
