Competitive examinations for the award of vacant scholarships in Clemson College will be held on Friday, July 9th, 1926, beginning at 9:00 a. m., by each County Superintendent of Education. These scholarships will be open to young men sixteen years of age or over, who desire to pursue courses in Agriculture and Textiles.

Persons interested should write the Registrar for information and application blanks before the time of the examinations. Successful applicants must meet fully the requirements for admission.

Each scholarship is worth \$100.00 and free tuition, which is \$40.00 additional. Membership in the Reserve Officers Training Corps—R. O. T. C.—is equivalent in money value to a scholarship during the junior and senior years.

These examinations may also be used as credit toward admission to college.
