The Coming Congress.

While South Carolina sends to Congress a full Democratic delegation of five members, the Republicans up North have made considerable gains, and the Democratic majority in the National House of Representatives has been reduced to twelve. If no President should be chosen by the people in 1880, and the election be thrown in the House of Representatives, California, which has not elected its representatives, will hold the balance of power. The great political battle must then be fought in the Golden State, and the chances are about even, as she now has two Democratic and two Republican Congressmen. The Republican gains in the North are attributed to the Southern outrage mill run by Blaine, Conkling & Co.

### Put Not Your Trust-in Repub-Heans.

The Pepublican State Convention endorsed Governor Hampton and our State ticket, but the rank and file of the party refused to endorse our nominees at the polls. They were undoubtedly acting under instructions from headquar. ters, and is possibly the first step in the new Yankee movement to deprive the colored people of the right of suffrage. It makes a great deal of difference with the Yankee when his own ox is gored.

### Governor Humpton Seriously Injured While Hunting.

A correspondent writing to the News and Couriet from Columbia, under date of November 8, says:

While hunting deer with a party of friends in the lower portion of this Hampton was riding became frighten- | ment is imperative. ed and, the bridle breaking, the Governor leaped from the saddle, receiving severe injuries in his fall. His right leg was broken in two places below the knee with the bones protruding, and the ankle is also badly in-

He was brought to Columbia this morning and is now lying at home. The prospect is that he will be confined to his bed for a long period.

COLUMBIA, November 8.—The following particulars in relation to the serious accident which befell Governor Hampton yesterday were obtained from a member of his family, and will be read with painful interest:

The Governor left Columbia on Wedneeday afternoon on his way to meet a party of gentlemen who had arranged for a deer hunt in the Wateres swamp next day, and had invited him to be present. Spending the night at the residence of Mr. Speigner, a few miles distant from the appointed repdezvous, Governor Hampton, next morning, (Thursday) exchanged his horse for a young half-broken mule, and proceeded alone towards the place where he expected to join the other members of his party. Just before reaching there, however, the pack of already on not scent, p within hearing, and the Governor, eaving the road, followed them until se obtained a shot at the flying deer. Boon after this, finding bimself in-volved in the thick undergrowth of the evemp, he leaned forward and threw his bridle rein over a small limb prey to diamounting. Finding himself thas suddenly disabled and left alone in the depths of the swamp, the mule too having disappeared on the instant, and so deprived him of the only means of seekng assistance, the Governor had recourse to his hunting horn, and the gun which be had retained in his hand, and employed them for nearly two long hours in the seemingly hopeless fort to summen the belp which he so sorely needed. The direction of the chase had, indeed, led the other genfemen engaged in the pursuit to within hearing of his signals, but these very common sounds natorally enough failed to attract attention, until the frequency of the reports of the gun in such an unusual quarter led Col. Thomas Taylor to suspect trouble of some kind and to send a colored man to inquire into the matter. This most providential messenger soon discovered the Govenor lying on the ground in the condition above described and suffering great pain, and quickly led the

party to his side, The trifling circumstance deserves to be noted in this connection that after first administering to his immediate wants, his sympathising and ad miring friends quickly observed that the sufferer, with his characteristic coolness and nerve, had 'ntilized the time and ammunition employed in his hours of signalling and suffering by firing at a distant mark, which mark, it was next ascertained, was fairly riddled with balls; or as one of them afterwards amuzingly declared, he had bit the bulls-eye every time !"

This labor accomplished at last the party started to Columbia, sixteen miles distant, and reached the Governor's home a little before midnight. Medical assistance had been summoned, and Dr. B. W. Taylor dressed the injured limb temporarily. It was found that the small bone of the right leg-was broken about six inches above the ankle; that the larger bode had. been completely severed just above. its terminus at the ankle justit, and that the upper end of the lower section had swerved from its place, and penetrating the surrounding firsh protruded into plain view. This protrusion of the bone had caused 'considerable loss of blood. The Governor was now left to the care of his family and friends for the night.

At an early hour this morning Drs. Taylor, Trezevant and Tailey, with neccessary apparatus, reduced the disregion of the ankle, A great deal of force we requisite, the operation being complicated by the attendant fracture. The Governor was kept for some time under the fine. ence of chloroform, and slept almost all the remainder of the day. The latest report just received is better than was expected. > The fact of the accident baving occurred was not known in Columbia until a late hour last night, and even then to only one or two persons. It was quickly rumored and co: firmed this morning, however, and the painfut news, as need scarcely be said, occasioned general and profound concern in all quarters and throughout

It was stated at one time that the surgeons in attendance had decided upon amputating the leg, in view of the serious nature of the injuries it had sustained, but direct inquiry upon this point elicited the gratifying reply. from an authoritative source, that such an operation is not necessary nor contemplated.

COLUMBIA, November 10 -The Governor is doing as well as could be hoped, considering the nature of his injuries. He has been able to sleep without the use of anodyne, and there is no immediate danger of such a degree of inflammation as to necessitate amputation or complicate his case. He receives all the attention that skill and anxious solicitude can suggest, and his advisers and friends are encouraged to believe that his wounds will heal naturally and kindly, though it is anticipated that some time will elapse before his final recovery.
