A NEW MILL FOR GAFFNEY.

The Capital Stock is Now Being Subscribed for a 10,000 spindle Cotton Mill.

Subscriptions to the capital stock for a 10,000 spindle cotton mill for Gaffney are not being solicited. The movement was put on foot yesterday. It is proposed that Gaffney's eminent business man and banker, Mr. A. N. Wood, be made president and treasurer, and the well known mill man, Mr. E. R. Cash, general manager and superintendent. When it is stated that these two gentlemen are interested it should be sufficient to induce others to go into the new company for both are known for their integrity and ability. Already more than half the capital stock has been subscribed and those who wish to get in on the ground floor should lose no time. This will make the second cotton mill for Gaffney. Let the good work continue.

City Registration Now Opened.

Mr. D. A. Thomas has been appointed by the city council as city registrar, his duty being to register those who desire to vote in the approaching municipal election, which takes place in March. Mr. Thomas' office will be in Sheriff Thomas' office in the court house and the office hours will be from 10 to 12 a. m., and from 1 to 3 p. m., and all those who desire to vote had best call on him and get a registration certificate. The law requires the registration to be open ninety days before the election, so the books were opened yesterday.

Meeting of the City Council.

The city council met last night in regular monthly session. There were present Mayor Johnson and all the aldermen. The ordinance changing the charter was ratified. The matter of establishing a volunteer fire department was discussed but no definite action was taken. The council put itself on record as opposing the closing of any alleys or streets that are now open. After the transaction of the routine business of the city council adjourned.
