

gala day and we want all our neigh-  
bors—Spartanburg, Union, York,  
Gaston and Cleveland counties—to  
come over and mingle with us. A  
royal good program will be arranged  
and the people will have a good time.

An interesting Lecture.

Rev. J. D. Bailey delivered a lecture  
before the Limestone College  
students in the college chapel  
Wednesday evening. Mr. Bailey  
confined himself to what we might  
call local history, and much of it un-  
written. He cited the young ladies  
to many points of historic interest in  
Cherokee county and of events leading  
up to the battle of Cowpens, which he described in detail. Dr. Lodge, in speaking of the lecture,  
said it was the most concise, instructive and pictorial description  
of a battle he had ever listened to.

during the next session, which will  
be a description of the battle of  
King's Mountain.

### CHEROKEE HAS A CHANCE To Display Her Agricultural Products at Northern Fairs.

Mr. M. V. Richards, the hustling  
land and industrial agent of the  
Southern railway, is getting up ex-  
hibits for fairs at the North, for the  
purpose of calling attention to the  
resources and possibilities of the  
South. In a letter to the Dodenhoff

expect.

Messrs. Dodenhoff & Darby will re-  
ceive and forward all such samples  
as furnished free of all charges to  
the growers. This is an opportunity  
to get the grain and grass products of  
Cherokee county well before prospec-  
tive home-seekers of the North, so  
they can see what can be profitably  
produced. It is hoped that farmers,  
generally, will give this very impor-  
tant matter the attention it deserves.
