FAR EASTERN SITU- ATION PORTRAYED

Latest and Most Reliable Infor-
mation of

AFFAIRS IN THE FAR EAST WAR

General Linevitch Reports that a Rus-
sian Detachment Has Successfully
Attacked the Japanese Trenches.
German Sailors Mutinied.

Tokio, May 24.—115 a. m.—Imperial
army headquarters made the following
announcement today:

"On the afternoon of May 21, a bat-
talion of Russian infantry and six
squadrons of cavalry attacked the
northern heights at Chinyangpao, 10
miles north of Weyuanpaomen, but
were repulsed. On the morning of May
22 a battalion of Russian infantry and
three troops of cavalry advanced
along the Kirin Taolu roads toward
Chienchentzu, and one company of in-
fantry gained the western height near
the village but were repulsed. The
Russian cavalry on the right bank of
the Liao river commenced a retreat on
the morning of May 22 and at 5 o'clock
in the afternoon the enemy had reach-
ed a point south of Talun, which lies
17 miles west of Fakumen.

"With the exception of small colli-
sions, there is otherwise, no change in
the situation."

St. Petersburg, May 24.—General
Linevitch, under date of May 23, re-
ports that a Russian detachment has
successfully attacked the Japanese
trenches on the heights north of the
station of Changtufu.

St. Petersburg, May 24.—The author-
ities here have no confirmation of the
report telegraphed from Tokio to the
London Daily Telegraph to the effect
that the Japanese have cut the rail-
road to Vladivostok and isolated that
fortress. The director of telegraphs
informed the Associated Press today
that there are two lines to Vladivostok,
one direct by way of Khabarovsk, Si-
beria, and the other via Harbin. The
former is working and no interruption
of the latter had been reported this
morning from Harbin, whence mes-
sages are constantly arriving. In-
quiries on the subject have been de-
pached to Harbin. The war office
has no news of the railroad being cut,
and the idea that the fortress is cut
off on the land side is regarded as ab-
surd, though it is always possible that
a small raiding party might reach the
railroad and temporarily damage it.
It is considered impossible, however,
that a Japanese force of sufficient
strength to hold the railroad and tem-
porarily damage it could have passed
through the Russian skirmish lines,
which keep in touch for the entire dis-
tance between General Linevitch's
army and the division along the Tu-
men river.

London, May 24.—The Great North-
ern Telegraph company's office in Lon-
don has received no intimation tend-
ing to confirm the statement cabled by
the Tokio correspondent of the London
Daily Telegraph, that the railroad line
to Vladivostok has been cut by the
Japanese with the result that the for-
tress is isolated.

St. Petersburg, May 24.—Later in
the day replies were received from
Harbin saying that both the railroad
and the telegraph lines to Vladivostok
were working, and the Associated
Press was authorized to deny the re-
port of the fortress' isolation.

Saigon, Cochinchina, May 24.—At
the request of the German consul here
the naval authorities have incarcerated
on board the French battleship
Redoubtable, the crew of the German
collier Hans Menzell, anchored off Nha
Be. The crew mutinied and refused
to continue the voyage, fearing war
risks.

Will Return to Odessa.

Odessa, May 24.—According to ad-
vices received here that General Kaul-
bars, commander of the Second Man-
churian army, will return to Odessa,
owing to the fact that his health is
shattered.

Trial of Senator for Bribery.

St. Louis, Mo., May 24.—The trial
of Senator Frank H. Farris on the
charge of bribery, which was set for
a hearing Tuesday in the criminal
court, was continued until next term
of court. The continuance was grant-
ed so that Farris might give testimony
in the trial for former Lieutenant Gov-
ernor Lee, at Jefferson City, on the
charge of perjury.

Hay's Heart Is Sound.

Bad Nauheim, Germany, May 24.—
The dilation of Secretary Hay's heart,
the functional disorder for which he
came here to be treated, has, accord-
ing to Professor Groedel, entirely dis-
appeared. The professor pronounces
Mr. Hay a well man. The latter will
return to work with interest.

ASK PRESIDENT TO VISIT MACON

Committee Will See Roosevelt Con-
cerning the Proposed Trip.
Macon, Ga., May 24.—It is announced
from the Macon chamber of commerce
that a committee of citizens will leave
Friday for Washington for the purpose
of inviting President Roosevelt to vi-
sit the city of Macon on the proposed
trip early in October. This action has
been taken since it was announced at
Washington that a southern trip had
been contemplated.

The committee is composed of five
members of the chamber of commerce,
with C. M. Adams as chairman. This
body of citizens will extend a warm in-
vitation.

Postmaster Edwards has stood in
close touch with the executive head of
the nation since he entered upon the
present administration, and his per-
sonal influence will be brought to bear
upon the situation.

PROMINENT MEXICAN SUICIDES.

Beside His Body Was Found a Picture
of a Woman.

New York, May 24.—Manuel Fernan-
dez del Valle, a Mexican, has killed
himself in his office on lower Broad-
way by shooting himself through the
mouth.

Del Valle was a member of an old
and wealthy family of Guadalajara,
Mex.

Beside the body of the suicide was
found the mutilated picture of a wo-
man, which the police believe may sup-
ply the motive for the deed.

Del Valle was about 40 years of age
and was an Oxford graduate. He was
married and his son is a student at
Notre Dame university, Ind.

Democratic Committeeman Shot.

McArthur, O., May 24.—J. N. Specht,
a prominent farmer and miller, and a
member of the Democratic executive
committee of Vinton county, was shot
early today by Mrs. Emma Flynn,
formerly of Columbus. Mrs. Flynn
was arrested today charged with the
murder. She claims that about 1
o'clock last night she noticed what she
supposed to be a tramp looking into
her window, and that securing a re-
volver, she fired through the glass and
barricaded herself in the house. Mr.
Specht's body was found by his family
at 1 o'clock this morning on the lawn
in front of the Flynn home with a bul-
let hole through his head over the left
eye. Mrs. Specht and Mrs. Flynn are
cousins and the families have been on
the best of terms.

Dynamite Is Found in Woman's Shoe.

Connellsville, Pa., May 24.—In the
office of District Attorney Thomas H.
Hudson, is a woman's shoe, the hol-
lowed heel of which, it is said, con-
tains enough dynamite and nitro-glyc-
erine to kill a number of persons. Last
night Mrs. Engle, of Uniontown, Pa.,
found a pair of ladies' shoes in her
back yard. While examining them
she found that the heel of one had
been hollowed out, four exploding caps
placed on four iron pegs set in and
the hole filled with waste, soaked with
nitro-glycerine. The shoes were turned
over to the authorities, who are
now making a rigid investigation.

Gov. Herrick Arrives at Columbus.

Columbus, O., May 24.—Because of
the lack of contest on nominations and
the late hour in the day set for the
first session the majority of the dele-
gates to the Republican state conven-
tion did not reach the city until today.
Those who arrived yesterday included
a number of leaders who conferred un-
til a late hour over the declaration of
principles, their number being in-
creased during the night by the arrival
of Governor Herrick.

Civil War Veteran Dies.

El Paso, May 24.—Colonel R. F.
Campbell, civil war veteran, ex-master
and ex-collector of revenue at Austin,
one of the best known men in the
southwest, died today of apoplexy. Col-
onel Campbell was well known in Chi-
cago and Washington. He had lived
at El Paso for 25 years.

Students Cleaning Streets.

Stockholm, May 24.—Students of the
high schools are cleaning the city's
streets in place of the regular street
cleaners, who have struck for better
conditions. Plenty of volunteers seem
ready to assist the municipal authori-
ties, and it is said in the event of a
continuance of the strike, military of-
ficers and civil officials intend to form
a street-cleaning brigade and take
turns in attending to the sanitary ne-
cessities of Stockholm.

Vicar Appointed Bishop.

Milwaukee, Wis., May 24.—The Very
Rev. Augustine Schinner, vicar gen-
eral of Milwaukee archdiocese for sev-
eral years past, has been appointed
bishop of superior diocese, recently
created by the re-division of the Mil-
waukee province. The appointment
has been made by Pope Pius X, and it
is believed the brief is already on its
way to America.
