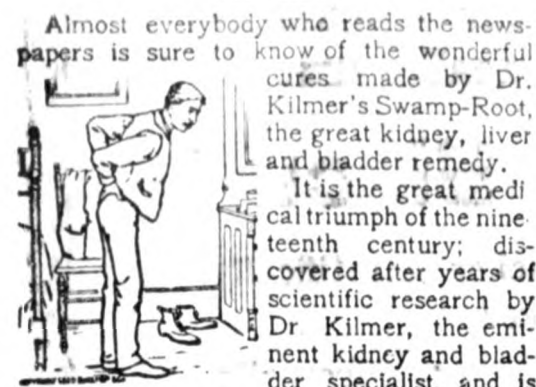

A SOCIETY OF WIDOWS

Chicago Women Unite to Resist Men's Wiles.

COLD SHOULDER FOR TRIFLERS.

Could Not Be Discouraged, but Whirlwind Marriage Panic Will Be Prevented—Admission Eden to Be Started on Community Plan—Grass Widows and Divorcees Barred. Children Will Be Welcomed.

The widows of Chicago, or, rather, a progressive portion of them, have organized to protect themselves from married men, triflers and the economic stress due to living the artificial life, says a Chicago dispatch. An application for a charter for the Widows' association has been made.

The object of the association is to provide a sort of a community home for widows, where they can have more freedom than in hotels and boarding houses and more congenial company than they can have in their flats or homes. As many of the widows have children, widows with children will be welcome in the home. Because of the "little encumbrances" they now find themselves boycotted by hotels and flimsy landlords. This is one of the crying evils that the association is to remove.

Only real widows are eligible to membership in the organization. Divorcees and grass widows are barred. The candidate for membership, be she young and pretty or old and plain, must produce evidence that "he" is dead for keeps. A death certificate may be required by the bylaws.

The widows have discovered that married men consider widows their prey. The rules governing the home will seek to prevent men from sailing under false colors. No married men will be allowed to make sentimental calls on widows, but married men friends may call if accompanied by their wives.

There is a class of unmarried men whom the widows put down as triflers who will not be welcome in the home. Experienced widows can always tell a trifle, but real young widows are pitied for him. The organization is intended to assist all members, and the experienced widow will see to it that the young and inexperienced are not fooled by the different species of male.

Mrs. Emma Tenny of 355 LaSalle, avenue is president of the Widows' association. Mrs. Emma Field of 1003 North Kedzie avenue is vice president, and Mrs. Emma Wassergard of 1225 Wabansia avenue is the secretary. There are fifty other widows in the combination. The majority of them are under thirty-five. While they will not discourage Cupid, they will see that there is no whirlwind marriage panic.

The moment a member marries she ceases to be a member. The social side of the home will be a special feature. There will be an assembly room for entertainments, reception room, a ballroom, library, play rooms and grounds for the children and everything that modern conditions require in the way of convenience and sanitary regulations.

The money to build will be subscribed by rich widows who have the betterment of their sisters at heart. There will be an initiation fee of \$5, but the community of interest plan to pay expenses has not yet been adopted. "We want the organization to mean something," said Mrs. Tenny. "I was left a widow with three children, and I found myself boycotted on every side because of my children. It required a hard struggle outside of the money side of the question to educate them. We propose to have widows educate their children where they will be surrounded by the best influences.

"The members may work outside or inside the home, and there will be a fine nursery where children will be given every attention. Thousands of widows could now earn good livings for themselves if they could only find a place where their children could be properly cared for while they were at work."

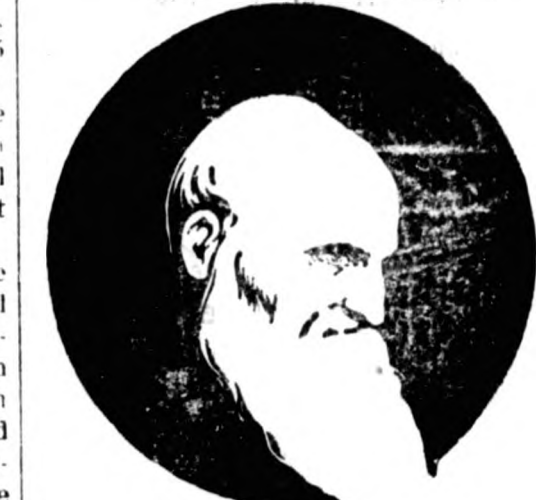
Salt and Epilepsy.

Charter of the South Carolina Public Service Corporation, Which if Granted Will Confer Among Other Things, Power to Condemn Lands and Other Property for all Corporate Purposes.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that under and pursuant to the provision of Article IV, Chapter XLVIII of Volume I, Code of Laws of the State of South Carolina, 1902, and Acts amendatory thereto, the undersigned Board of Corporators will on Wednesday, the sixteenth day of January, A. D. 1907, at 12 o'clock M. of that day, make application to the Secretary of State, of the State of South Carolina, at his office in the City of Columbia, in the said State, for a charter for the South Carolina Public Service Corporation, in pursuance of the Declaration heretofore filed and the commission issued.

If the said Charter be granted, the said Corporation will be authorized and empowered to condemn lands and other property for its proposed Railroad or Railway tracks and stations, and landings for its proposed Steamboat business or system, and for all other corporate purposes of the said corporation as fully set forth and stated in the said Declaration and Petition, now on file in the said office of the Secretary of State, to which Declaration reference is hereby specially made as a part of this notice, and proposes to condemn lands and other property for all of its corporate purposes, if necessary, in the following Counties, to wit: Charleston, Berkeley, Dorchester, Orangeburg, Richland, Lexington, Saluda, Greenwood, Abbeville, Anderson, Greenville, Spartanburg, Cherokee, York, Chester, Fairfield, Union, Newberry, Laurens, Aiken, Colleton and Bamberg in the State of South Carolina, and Mecklenburg County in the State of North Carolina; and also in the following Towns and Cities:
