THE COUNTY PAPER IN THE CLUBS.—At the meeting of the Democratic County Executive Committee, held on Friday, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That we recommend to each of the subordinate clubs in the county to authorize and direct its secretary to subscribe for the weekly NEWS AND HERALD, and to have that paper constantly on file at the club headquarters.

The Winnsboro Democratic Club met, pursuant to adjournment, on Thursday evening. After examining the roll, the president announced that the club was entitled to two additional delegates to the County Convention.

RESOLUTIONS.—At the meeting of the Democratic County Executive Committee, held on Friday, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted and ordered to be published:

Resolved, That the thanks of this Executive Committee be, and are hereby, tendered to the Chairman and the Secretary of the Committee, for the able and efficient manner in which they have performed their duties for the past two years.

Resolved, That we urge upon the County Convention and the County Executive Committee respectively their re-election.

AROUND TOWN.—Everybody is delighted with the trip to Ridgeway. The town council are having the ditches cleaned out, and making other improvements.

MONTECELLO DEMOCRATIC CLUB.—The Monticello Democratic Club met at its rooms on the afternoon of June 7, 1878, and was called to order by the president.

The following resolution, offered by Mr. Phil. P. Pearson and seconded, with a slight amendment, by Mr. H. M. Zealy, was adopted amid much enthusiasm:

Resolved, That we heartily endorse the claims of Maj. T. W. Woodward upon the gratitude of his peers, and in approving the action of our Jackson's Creek friends in proposing him as our next representative in Congress, we instruct our delegates to advocate his cause in the approaching convention with might and main.

Resolutions were offered by Col. Jno. B. Davis, Mr. H. M. Zealy and Mr. Phil. P. Pearson, respectively, approving the course of Mr. H. A. Gaillard as our representative, and expressive of the confidence of the

club in his ability and integrity, at the same time pledging him their hearty support for re-election in the coming canvass. After some discussion, the resolutions offered by Colonel Davis were adopted, as follows:

Resolved, That we deem the course of Hon. H. A. Gaillard in the Legislature manly and conscientious, and we cordially endorse the nomination of him for Representative made by different parties throughout the county.

Resolved, That we hold the view that genuine civil government is self-government, and that one of its essential conditions is the recognition of the right of all classes of its subjects, of whatever calling or shade of political belief, to a fairly proportionate voice in its councils; and that we regret to notice the action of our Feasterville brethren in dissenting from this sound Democratic doctrine, and we are prompted by this circumstance to place ourselves on record concerning it.

On motion of Mr. Phil. P. Pearson, it was ordered that the proceedings of the meeting be published in THE NEWS AND HERALD.

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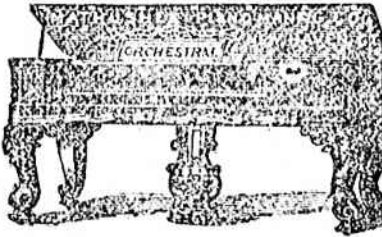
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
