The Board authorized to contract for artificial limbs for maimed Confederate soldiers, under the Act recently passed by the Legislature, met last week in Columbia. The following preamble and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, by its terms the money to carry into effect the Act to provide artificial limbs for soldiers of the State, approved December 24, 1879, cannot be paid out from the treasury until all the other appropriations of that session have been been met by incoming taxes, yet the Board deem it proper at once to take the preliminary steps necessary its execution.


