The Democratic County Executive Committee met on Tuesday, but transacted no business further than providing for a good representation of the county Democracy at the Columbia ratification meeting on the 7th instant.

The Congressional Convention of the Fourth District was held at Chester on the 1st instant. Col. J. M. Evans, of Spartanburg, was nominated on the first ballot, receiving 21 votes.

The Dauntless Nine of this place played a match game of base ball in Chester on Tuesday afternoon last with the Chester club.

Club Meeting of Oakland.—The Oakland Club met on Saturday last. After the business transactions, speeches were made by Capt. H. A. Galliard, Col. B. E. Elkin, for senate, Mr. G. H. McMaster, Maj. C. E. Thomas and Mr. J. W. Lylos, for representatives.

A resolution was passed asking the Democratic Executive Committee to have the primaries as early as possible. Let the ball move on. Let us have the primaries now. We want to know the nominees. While we are divided among ourselves our foes are united and watching for our weak points.

The opening of the State campaign on the 7th instant, should be a success, and the Executive Committee is authorized to call on Oakland for twenty-five men.

STATE NORMAL INSTITUTE.—This Institute closed Friday last. Dr. Whiteford Smith made an eloquent address on "Better is the beginning of a thing than the end thereof." Mr. R. O. Sams called Mr. W. K. Blake to the chair and offered a series of resolutions for the teachers, thanking the citizens of Spartanburg and Faculty of the Institute. Mr. Blake, in presenting the resolutions, which were carried unanimously, made some very happy remarks. Superintendent Thompson being called on spoke with his usual eloquence. Messrs. Archer, Bismann and Davis spoke words of farewell. Major Thompson then, on behalf of the teachers and faculty, presented Prof. Soldan with a handsome silver goblet, as a testimonial of esteem. The recipient acknowledged the gift in a few touching remarks, and then the exercises were closed by the doxology and the benediction.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCHES.

Some More Citizens Who Have Honored Fairfield.

ROCK CREEK, August 18, 1880.—I did not intend, when I first set out to record the memories of the departed men of worth in Western Fairfield, to make mention of any but those living anterior to the year 1830. Yet I was jolt to pass by those of later date. In this connection, I take pleasure in making worthy mention of the following: Walter L. and Jas. Wallace Counts, Henry Lyles who died of fever in camp, and his son Woodward, who was killed in battle, and Bird Chapman's son (name not recollected), all these I think, except Walter L. C., and Henry Lyles fell in the battle of Seven Pines. Walton and Robert Crowder, I think, fell at Petersburg. John Neveitt, I forget where; he was a brave and christian soldier. All these brave young men deserve respectful notice for their untold hardships and self-sacrificing virtues in the Lost Cause. I forgot to mention that Jas. Wallace Counts received a deadly wound, which sent him to the hospital at Richmond Va., where he died in the full hope of eternal felicity. Robert Crowder, father of Walton and Robert, deserves respectful notice as a man of industry and honesty. He died on my plantation in December 1846. Capt. Robert F. Coleman, a worthy citizen and kind neighbor, and practical farmer, died near Rock Hill in 1843. His brother, Henry Coleman, was a strictly honest and worthy citizen, and kind neighbor, and died near Keasterville at a green old age not long since. Capt. John Q. Arnett lived with us for many years and was a respectable farmer and merchant at Buck Head; he died in Georgia in his native county not long before the late war. Andrew McClerkin lived near Buck Head as a respectable school teacher for many years, and died at Lyles Ford, I think, during the late war. Jesse Edgington was born and died at Rock Creek, at the age of seventy-seven and a half years, and was noted for his wit and humor, and eccentricities, and fondness for hogs, in the rearing of which he excelled. He was a neat and good neighbor, and what Pope calls the noblest work of God—an honest man. Micajah Mobley, John Meador and Daniel, his son, lived and died on Beaver Creek. Micajah M. was a consistent member of Rock Creek Baptist Church when I was a boy, and would often become so enthused under Dr. Woodward's pulpit eloquence, that he would rise in church and give vent to his emotions. He died at an advanced age some forty or fifty years ago. He and John Meador, it was said, were never found without corn for sale, and were kind neighbors and respectable citizens. Daniel Meador was a worthy citizen, kind neighbor and exemplary christian, and died after a prolonged illness not long before the late war. I will now bring to a close my feeble sketches, with the hope that I may not be charged with discrimination, and be pardoned for omissions. I may give your readers an article or two on the present in contrast with the past if I don't leave you all in my old age.

Thanks to "Co. H., Old Sixth," for supplying omissions in your issue of the 24th ult. I did not have dates and places at hand, and thought incidents might answer without them.

I hope our citizens will not omit sewing bountifully of turnip seed, as food will be scarce next winter, and I think this is one year that cotton should be topped to hasten its maturity.
