THE FEDERAL CAPITAL.

Meeting of the Senate—James L. Fugh—Hayes' Message—The Republican Aggression and Democratic Opportunity.

WASHINGTON, December 7.—In the history of the United States, and the memory of men, no session of Congress went out so quietly as the last.

The galleries in each branch were sparsely filled with curious spectators, and along the corridors between the Senate and House lingered and loitered a lot of idle people of both sexes.

After roll call in the Senate, Alabama contributed to the National Council a broad and conservative statesman in the person of James L. Fugh, the bravest man in her borders and the peer of any and all of those who wear the sona orna toga.

The House attempted to put in some work in the shape of bills and resolutions while waiting for the message of Mr. Hayes. When it came at last, and the reading clerks had droned through two hours of political platitudes to dull ears, an adjournment was had.

The message was characteristic of its author—dull, passive and negative—two passages only elicited remark or comment, the one mapping out the future legislation in regard to the representation of the South in districts where there is a preponderance of negro voters, and the other to co-fer upon General Grant the title, in a casual and honorific manner, which S. A. has long since conferred upon the governor of Cuba, the best and richest of her possessions—the "ever-faithful Isle."

It is given out by the servants of the people that there will be a busy session, embracing the necessary appropriations bills, and such measures of financial and political economy as the country most need at present.

By both parties it is asserted with great dogmatism that there will be no extra session, and really neither the one nor the other desires it, but one might as well attempt to prognosticate as to the weather on the 4th of March next as to try to cast the political horoscope three months hence.

The Democrats have an opportunity that should not be lost. If they will devote them selves to legitimate business, display a liberality in keeping with the wants and demands of a great and groing country, avoid factious debates, and bring to bear statesmanship more catholic than heretofore, it is within easy range that they may repair some of the disasters of the past, and perhaps recover the House at the next Congressional election.

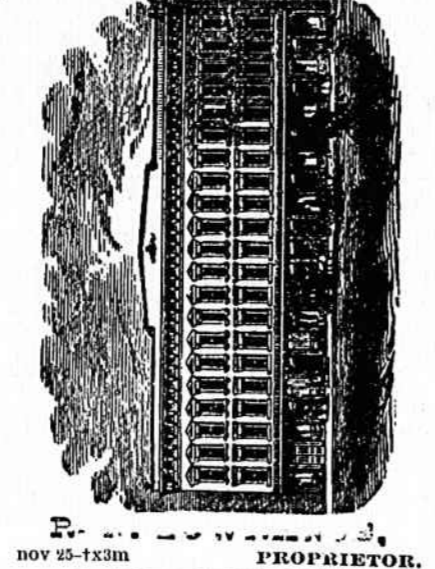

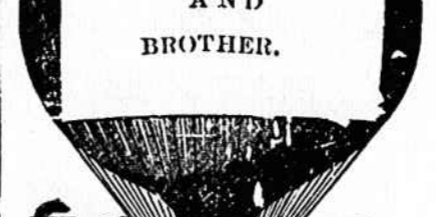

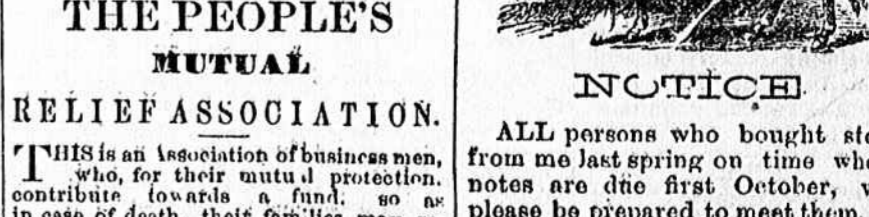
