ity is the incapacity of the soldier who thinks truth is erected by his bayonet and that it may be shot to death with musket and ball. Now I maintain that this cause will not die in these United States. The liberty loving people of this land know that they brought-th's sentiment and principle over with them from England, and upon is they buil led this goodly land of equal rights to all men; no state religio", no creed; this broad land for broad minded men; this land of the wilderne-s for human na ure to take a new start in, and to push the cause of the individual citizen away from and from under the sway of kings and nobles and to dress man in the native robes of his manhood. But to do this, to accomplish this exaltation of man and to realize this idea of citizenship no men knew better than the P.ymoth fathers that you must let man alone as much as possible, that the principle of such a government was the self government of the citizen, that the condition of civil liberty, as they wanted it, was that man must be left to work out his own destiny in this land, unimpeded and unrestrained as little as possible by government. Again and in order that the liberty thus indicated might not degenerate into license and to supply the place of a strong arm of government. they knew that the common law of England which means the customs of the people, was strong enough to restrain the citizen and lax enough for him to grow and increase And now I am prepared to say without any fear of contradiction, that this government was built upon the idea of the local law of the township, the village, the pari-h, the municipality, and that out of such assemblages of government this land has grown to its present greatness and out of these groups come the spirit and sentiment of all

I again assert that most all the trouble in this country has proceeded from a violation of this principle of local self-government, and every time you trample on this principle the peop'e of these United States will take the alarm, and if you do not stop, the musket will answer for their indig nation. 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

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
