Carlisle on a Gold Standard. In speaking of the effect of the act of 1873, Mr. Carlisle says: "The plain truth is that this Act of 1873, which has been the subject of so much of full legal tender silver dollars at morning, headed by the mayor of the misapprehension and denunciation, the ratio of 16 to 1 means that our law town, who never lags behind on any was simply a legal recognition of a monetary condition which had existed in fact in this country for about thirtyfive years, or ever since a short time after the passage of the coinage Act of 1834. From about 1838 to 1878, the time of the passage of the Bland-Allison Act, no silver dollars were in circulation in this country, the currency consisting of gold and bank notes, except from 1862 to 1878, when our active circulation outside of California and its neighboring territory, was all paper. Custom dues and interest on the public debt were paid in gold. The value of United States notes or greenback was always measured in gold. Commodities had a gold price and a paper price; never a silver price. For eleven years prior to 1873, even the subsidiary silver coins were not in use. "Our own monetary history had already furnished two most striking illustrations of the operation of the natural law under which the coins which are over-valued by statute always drive out of circulation the coins which are under-valued. Our own experience had again demon-trated what the history of the world already showed-that whenever the coinage laws of any country permit the coinage of both metals with full same wav." legal tender qualities at a ratio of Mr. Carlisle defines his positon thus: value, which does not substantially conform to their intrinsic value in the markets of the world, both cannot be kept in circulation at the same time. Our first coinage laws, 1792, put the ratio of the two metals at 15 to 1. that is 15 pounds of silver were to be considered equal in value to one pound of gold, and the weig ts of the coin adjusted to that rule. This ratio was not fixed by law, but the relative intrinsic value of the metals was det rmined by the marke sof the country. It soon developed that 15 pounds of silver were not in fact equal in value to I pound of gold. Silver had been over-valued by statute and gold had been under-valued. Therefore, under the operation of the natural law, gold had disappeared fr m the country by 1812, and until the passage of the Act of 1834 the United States had practically silver monometallism. "A very small percentage of difference between the legal ratio and the commercial ratio has always been found sufficient in modern times to drive the under-valued metal entirely out and substitute the other, or paper based upon the other, in its place, and no Congress or Parliament can repeal or alter the natural law of trade by which this movement of the metals is governed." Here were two illustratrations of the law, in the one case silve: was over-valued, and in the other gold was over-valued.

In 1853 Congress, in order to maintain the circulation of subsidiary coins-half dollars, quarters and dimes-reduced the metal contained in them and made them legal tender in payment of sums not exceeding five dollars. Consequently these came into use until expelled by the cheaper paper money issued during the war; not being full legal tender they could not drive out the gold coins.

This was the condition in 1873. Our actual measure of value was gold, and our actual circulating medium was paper, with a purchasing power measured by the gold standard. We had no silver and it had no influence whatever on our prices, and on our ability to pay debts. "The Act of 1873, therefore, did not and could not take away from the people of the United States any advantage they then possessed, but it did prevent the coinage of full legal tender silver dollars thereafter, and the Act of 1874 destroyed the debt-paying power of the old silver being in circulation, it had no paractical effect on debtors to pay their debts. Thus we remained until 1878. 
