GENERAL BUTLER. Republicans are Gloating Over His Anti-Democratic Views. Manufacturers' Review. Gen. Matthew C. Butler, ex-United States Senator from South Carolina, is in danger of being denounced as an enemy of the South and a traitor to his party by some of the rampant party men and papers of the South, who can see only evil in every man that dares to say that Bryanism is not what the South needs. In an interview published in the New York Times, Butler is quoted as follows: "The South has never been so prosperous at any time since the civil war as it is today, and I think that this gratifying condition of affairs is due principally to the high prices at present being paid for cotton. I believe, furthermore, that if the present conditions continue it will only be a short time before the South is thoroughly on her feet again. In saying this I do not speak as a politician, for I have been out of politics now for many years, but from the standpoint of a Southern farmer, to which class I belong."

ONE of the most useful campaigners in the field is David B. Hill, of New York. He is making a very vigorous and aggressive campaign in New York for Bryan and Stevenson. He is doing his best, and that means a great deal. The Republicans fear Hill, and they hate him. We expect Hill's efforts to bear fruit in New York, and here we may say that it is gratifying that David B. Hill has come to the front once more. He is too useful a man to be shelved.

WE have received from the Secretary of State's office copy of the election laws together with instructions to the commissioners of election. The election will be held on the 6th of November. Managers and all those connected with the election should carefully study Secretary of State Cooper's well prepared instructions. The commissioners will publish the notice required by law.

GRANT'S WEATHER FORECAST FOR OCTOBER. Restless, unsettled condition of the atmosphere will prevail from 1st to 3rd with quicken storm movements about the 2nd to 8th, with local rains. As these disturbances pass over, cool, autumn weather will prevail generally from 3rd to 5th. On the 5th the moon will cross the equator on her way northward. About the 6th it will turn warm; hazy weather will prevail, about the 6th to the 8th on the Atlantic coast. Moon in opposition to the sun on the 8th and also at perigee. A very cool wave will follow this disturbance. Frost and freezing will be natural over the Northern and Middle States and in portion of the Southern from about the 8th to 10th, with bright moonlight nights. On the 12th the moon is at her farthest point north. About the 11th it will turn much warmer and unsettled blustery weather will prevail from 11th to 14th, followed by very cool weather on the 15th and 16th generally. On the 19th the moon will cross the equator on her way southward. I name the 17th to 20th as a general storm period; general rains will prevail over a very large scope of country with high winds, and some active gales are very probable on the Atlantic Coast. States; 21st and 22nd, fair; moon in conjunction to the sun on the 23rd, which will cause an atmospheric unrest from 23rd to 26th; cloudiness and blustery will be the general conditions, probably some rain. Some heavy gales need not be a surprise on the North Atlantic States. Moon will be at her southern declination on the 27th. From the 27th to 29th fair and beautiful; on or about the 30th and 31st cloudiness and some rain. Upon the whole, October promises to be rather a stormy month, more especially in the Northern and North Atlantic States from the 6th to close of month.

The tax levy for State purposes is 5 mills; for ordinary county purposes, 4 mills; for school purposes, 3 mills; making a total levy of 12 mills on all taxable property of the county. There is an additional, a special tax, for school purposes of 2 mills in School Districts Nos. 1, 9, 14, 17, 18 and 25, making a total levy of 14 mills in those school districts, and a special school tax of 1 mill in No. 19, making a total levy of 15 mills in that school district. There is also a tax of one dollar on each male citizen between the ages of 21 and 60 years, except those who are disabled or are made exempt by law. Taxes are payable in the following kinds of funds and no other: Gold and silver coin, United States currency, national bank notes, and coupons which shall become due and payable during the year 1901 on the consolidated bonds known as "Brown" bonds, and the bonds of the State known as "Blue" bonds, and any other State bonds which may be issued by authority of an Act of Assembly, the coupons of which are by such Act made receivable for taxes.
