

He Threw Away His Life.

John Glenn Little, formerly of Laurens County, Killed by a Train in Atlanta

Glenn Little, as he was familiarly called, was a native of this county and removed to Atlanta, Ga., several years ago, to accept a position in Robinson's box factory.

On Friday morning dispatches from Atlanta announced the sad intelligence of his death, of which event the papers give the following account.

From all that can be ascertained Little's death appears to have been due largely to his own carelessness, or to a disregard for life.

He was on the railroad, talking to the watchman, when the Georgia train came in sight. He said he could ride in to the main station on the caboose.

As he said this to Mr. Allen the watchman, Little stepped across the track, and upon the end of the cross-ties of another track running parallel with the one upon which the Georgia freight was moving.

The edge of the track upon which he stood was the one used by the Richmond & Danville trains and upon it the Air Line bells were then moving backward, being pushed from the passenger depot to the shops.

When Little got upon the Air Line track he stood facing the Georgia train, with his back towards the Air Line hole, which was then nearer to him than the freight.

The watchman had seen the bell, and presumed, of course, that Little had seen it too, but as he made to get off the ends of the ties as the train came closer to him, Allen called out:

"Take care there! There comes that Air Line train."

"Believing that Little had heard the warning and would leave the cross-ties before the train reached him, Allen turned his attention to the freight, which was drawing nearer.

In a minute, however, he glanced toward the Air Line track again. Little had not changed his position, and the rear end of the train was within a few yards of him.

His eyes were apparently riveted upon the freight train, and fearing that the man did not realize his danger, Allen raised his flag and again yelled:

"Look out, there; that train will strike you."

Little turned his head toward the Air Line train, and at the same time stepped across the rail upon the track immediately in front of the coach.

In a second the end of the car struck him. The train was moving with a fair speed, and the force was sufficient to knock the man down.

In the fall Little's body cleared the rail, but his legs fell across it and the wheels passed over them.

In some way his coat became entangled in the brake, and as long as the train moved the unfortunate young man was dragged along the ground, his head and face thumping against the ends of the ties.

The train was stopped as quickly as possible and the man taken out. His face was bloody and bruised and his feet hanging by a shred.

Almost immediately after he was removed from under the train he looked about him, remarking:

"I guess the road will have to pay for this."

The train men about Little made him as comfortable as possible, and sent for a physician, but before anything could be done he began sinking rapidly, and within a few minutes after the accident breathed his last.

An inquest was held and the body was then shipped to this place for interment.
