The Fruits of the North.
PORT JERVIS, N. Y.,

LAURENS ADVERTISER:
To sending a few specimens of fruit to a friend in Laurens, it occurred to me to say a few words through your paper regarding its production in these parts, and offer a few suggestions to readers in your section. On my several visits to your State, I have noticed the small number of orchards and vineyards, and the bareness of the markets in the towns, of fruits of the various kinds.

Now, I am very sure that where trees of almost every kind grow so well, fruit bearing ones can be made to yield. It is a matter I think of simple neglect in planting and then not caring for the trees when planted.

All through this very region the same condition of things existed twenty-five or thirty years ago. Now we usually have abundance, and the demand of the market is for a larger supply as the people have come to perceive its value as a necessary part of the food and conducive to health.

Our town of a population of only ten thousand expends \$50,000 to \$60,000 each year for the same. I mention this simply to show the progress on this line and as suggestive of how the community can be brought to appreciate a good thing you would be right with you—and here with care and attention succeed—you certainly ought to do so. Naturally, one after knowing of your climate and soil, concludes that the fault is with the people, just as it was with us in not planting and not giving attention to the trees when put in the ground.

Every kind of fruit, perhaps, ought to do as well in your "upper South" as with us. When it is remembered that we are living in a climate where frosts come so early in the fall, and here with care and attention succeed—you certainly ought to do so. Naturally, one after knowing of your climate and soil, concludes that the fault is with the people, just as it was with us in not planting and not giving attention to the trees when put in the ground.

They are attached with screws to a small bar of wood running from one side of gin to the other; there the bar is made secure by two right angle castings, the shields in no way interfere with falling notes or working of the gin.
