The building will be handsome and commodious, containing ticket, telegraph and other offices and waiting rooms equipped with all modern fixtures and conveniences. Servants will be employed to keep the rooms in order, and every possible requirement for the comfort of travellers will be carefully provided.

All of this is great and glad news for our people. It means that Laurens is soon to become one of the most important points in the mighty Terminal System as well as that for connections and convenience of travel the place will be unexcelled.
