Explanation of Flag Signals. Number 1, white flag, six feet square Number 1, white flag, six feet square, indicates clear or fair weather. Number 2, blue flag, six feet square, indicates rain or snow. Number 3, white and blue flag (parallel bars of white and blue), six feet square, indicates that local rains or showers will occur, and that the rainfall will not be general. Number 4, black triangular flag, four feet at the base and six feet in length, always refers to temperature; when placed above numbers 1, 2, or 3 placed below numbers 1, 2, or 3 it indicates colder weather; when not displayed, the indications are that the temperature will remain stationary, or that the change in temperature will not vary more than four degrees from the temperature of the same hour of the preceding day from March to October, inclusive, and not more than six degrees for the remaining months of the placed below numbers 1, 2, or 3 it indigrees for the remaining months of the year. Number 5, white flag, six feet square, with black square in center indicates the approach of a sud-den and dicided fall in temperature. This signal is not to be displayed un-less it is expected that the temperature will fall to forty-two degress, or lower, and is usually ordered at least twentyfour hours in advance of the cold wave When number 5 is displayed, number 4 is always omitted.
