We insist upon this policy as especially necessary for the protection of the farmers and laboring classes, the first and most defenceless victims of an unstable money and a fluctuating currency." Thus spoke the Democratic party of the whole United States "in convention assembled

United States "in convention assembled in Chicago." And thus speaks Mr. Evans the prospective Governor of South Carolina. Is he a Democrat?


