An intelligent jury of inquest over the bodies of the slain failed o ascertain who did the fine execution. Probably nothing will come of it: "let her roll" is the motto of the dispensary advocates.

The mules of the wagon were shot also. Fisher was well known in Laurens. He lived at Tryon, just across the Carolina line. He was brave, generous and hospitable. Governor Evans is getting a good report from his constabulary. "Peace hath her victories as well as war."


